

# The Year in Review 2006: Part 1 - January to June

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daughter and husband, despite the family having a Scotch Plains mailing address. She told *The Leader/Times* that the Red Cross does not intend to press charges because the bill was in Ms. Lewis' name, but the hotel would press charges for non-payment.

Superintendent of Schools William Foley presented a plan to the BOE to convert the former Lincoln School facility on Westfield Avenue to a centralized kindergarten. More than 100 residents attended a standing-room-only meeting with BOE and Union County Education Services (UCESC) officials over ongoing neighborhood safety concerns for UCESC-operated Hillcrest Academy, which leases the Lincoln building from the BOE. The meeting followed the arrest of four Hillcrest students for allegedly vandalizing a home in the neighborhood and stealing a car at the train station in May.

The BOE later announced it would terminate the lease of the school to Hillcrest Academy South; the UCESC has leased the school since 1982.

In an e-mail sent to residents and *The Leader/Times*, Board President Anne Riegel stated, "The board of education is regretful that the situation has developed to this point."

UCESC Superintendent Ed Hartnett told *The Leader/Times* that the commission planned to petition the New Jersey Department of Education (DOE) commissioner's office of controversies and disputes for "emergent relief, which means we will be asking the commissioner to direct the Westfield [BOE] to give us time to locate a new facility," he said.

The DOE later ruled that the UCESC could remain in the facility through the 2006-2007 school year.

Based upon the recommendations of the Citizen's Advisory Committee on Enrollment (CACE), the BOE unanimously approved a proposal to renovate Lincoln School to become the district-wide "early childhood center."

The proposal, with a price tag of \$5,828,707, would be presented to the public as a bond referendum.

The BOE voted unanimously in favor of Schools Superintendent William Foley's decision to transfer the Washington and Wilson School principals, effective July 1. The plan involved moving current Washington School Principal Joseph Malanga to Wilson School. Cheryl Dunkiel Berkowitz, the coordinator of the gifted and talented program, began work as a half-time vice-principal. Wilson Principal Andrew Perry moved to Washington.

The town completed the final portion of repealing the South Avenue and Elm Street redevelopment plans, which had involved the ultimately unsuccessful parking deck proposal. The measure passed readopted the July 1998 zoning map, which pre-dates redevelopment plans.

The BOE unanimously approved the appointment of Dennis Fyffe as interim WHS principal. Mr. Fyffe earns \$650 per day for the one-year contract position, commencing July 1. He came to Westfield with 35 years of experience, most recently serving as interim superintendent of schools for the Long Beach Island Board of Education. He was superintendent of schools in Sayreville from 2000 through 2005, having first served at the assistant superintendent from 1997 through 2000.

Mr. Fyffe was chosen after Summit High School (SHS) Assistant Principal Anthony Akey told Westfield BOE officials he would not accept an offer to become WHS principal. The BOE had been scheduled to vote to ap-

prove Mr. Akey's appointment to replace the retiring Robert Petix.

According to a statement released by Superintendent of Schools William Foley, Mr. Akey was not willing to relinquish the tenure that he holds as SHS assistant principal. He worked at SHS since 1980, where he started as a social studies teacher.

On June 22, the 422 members of the WHS class of 2006 had a graduation ceremony at the Westfield National Guard Armory.

New concept plans for the redesign of Westfield Memorial Park were unveiled to the public at a special meeting hosted by the recreation commission on June 21.

Preliminary plans for the renovation of Memorial Park include reconfiguring and extending the existing softball diamonds to enable more teams to play simultaneously. By reconfiguring the diamonds, a half-acre of green space would be added to the existing half acre, Recreation Director Bruce Kaufman said. This would also expand the existing multi-purpose field to be entirely on green space instead of extending into the clay softball diamonds.

The tennis courts would be moved in order to turn the existing tennis courts into additional parking and additional green space for fields. A basketball court would be added as well as a pathway surrounding the park. The commission is considering connecting the pathway to a path that surrounds neighboring Brookside Park in Scotch Plains.

The redesign of the ball fields would extend the diamonds 120 feet to the west, eliminating an area of woodlands behind several homes that front onto North Scotch Plains Avenue. No lighting and no sound amplification were planned, Mr. Kaufman told residents.

The town council agreed to raise certain fees related to sidewalk cafés, limousine and filming licenses. In addition, the Code Review and Town Property Committee gave an update on its plan to curtail overdevelopment and would name a committee to incorporate planning-board recommendations.

Police charged a Westfield woman in the stabbing of a fellow town resident that occurred on June 20 as the two argued on the 200 block of Windsor Avenue.

Sergeant Scott Rodger of the Westfield Police Department told *The Leader/Times* that the suspect, Danielle Woods, 34, turned herself in at Westfield police headquarters.

According to Sergeant Rodger, Ms. Woods allegedly stabbed the 20-year-old victim with a knife at about 10 p.m. during what began as a verbal altercation, leaving the victim with wounds to the left arm, both shoulders and facial area. Ms. Woods reportedly left the scene before police arrived. The victim was treated at Overlook Hospital in Summit and released.

Ms. Woods was charged with aggravated assault, unlawful possession of a weapon and possession of a weapon for unlawful purpose. She was transported to the Union County jail, with bail set at \$10,000.

The BOE discussed a new wellness and nutrition regulation for the school system.

"Cupcakes are in," said board member Gary Maher as he began the discussion with a summary of the education committee's findings, which included rules about food items in schools. The new regulations, which went into effect September 1, include a district-wide candy ban and limiting birthday celebrations to kindergarten through third-grade students.
