Walk Down Memory Lane

July 1, 2006: The Westfield Blue topped the Cranford 12-year-old baseball team, 5-1, in the second round of the Cal Ripken District tournament at Gumbert Field. Slugger John Lanzano blasted two home runs. Nathan Mitchell smacked a double and an RBI single and John DeDea tapped two singles.

June 30, 2005: St. Nicholas rallied for six runs in the bottom of the seventh inning to tie St. Luke, 22-22, in a St. Bart's Oldtimers Men's Softball League game called due to darkness at Brookside Park. Luke's Tim Deegan finished 5-for-5, including two doubles, with two runs scored. St. Nick slugger Marty Marks was walked in all four of his plate appearances, once with the bases loaded.

July 2, 2004: The 12-5 Scotch Plains-Fanwood Senior Legion baseball team's thunder bats, along with strong pitching, brought Rahway to its knees with a, 8-0, shutout. Kyle Gates, who pitched seven innings, used just 73 pitches, allowing five hits, while striking out three and walking one.

July 3, 2003: Fourth of July fireworks began early at Brookside Park as a rowdy St. James Gang shot down St. Jude, 17-3. The culprits leading this offensive humbling were Gang

members Neal LeStrange (2 doubles, 3 RBI and 1 run scored), Larry Szenyi (3-for-3, 2 RBI and 2 runs scored), and Mike Brennan (double, single, 3 runs scored and 1 RBI).

July 2, 2002: On the most humid day of the year, base running strategies, key defensive wizardry, make-shift umpiring and a massive home run blast dictated the flow and the outcome of the eight-inning game won by Shady Lane, 6-5, over Poplar Place in Fanwood Old Men's Softball Association action at Forest Road Park. Shady Lane centerfielder Rob Denner went 4-for-4, scored two runs, stole three bases and set up the winning run, scored by Phil Manno. Kevin Maloney left an impact by crushing a two-run homer.

July 2, 2001: Placed First in the B Division of the Scotch Plains Men's Softball League. Chico's Bail Bonds bullied the struggling Misfits and grabbed a 13-6 victory at Brookside Park. Larry Marsella had three singles and two RBI. Guy Buonpane rapped a double and a single, and scored three runs.

July 2, 1998: The Mattress Factory brought its big guns and blasted Cellular Signal, 15-4, in Westfield Men's Softball League action at Tamaques Park. The Mattress Factory controlled the game from the start with three runs in the first inning scored by Kevin Zippler, Tom Perotta and Tim Walsh.

BDLC Lax Girls Finish Successful Lacrosse Season

The Blue Devils Lacrosse Club (BDLC) concluded its third season competing in competitive tournaments in New Jersey this spring. Both BDLC girls select teams were undefeated against New Jersey opponents.

The BDLC grade 5/6 girls' team finished 11-0 in N.J. and beat both Moorestown teams twice, outscoring them 33-4. The Blue Devils finished with an overall record of 13-1. Every player scored at least one goal with the exception of the goalie, who was preoccupied stopping shots. Against New Jersey opponents, the Blue Devils averaged almost nine goals per game, while allowing less than two goals per game.

As the season progressed, the girls learned to move the ball up field very quickly through passing. In the season's final tournament, 34 percent of the goals were assisted goals as the

players learned to trust and find their teammates open in the offensive end of the field. Defensively, the Blue Devils learned how to stop a fast break and only allowed two fast break goals all season. BDLC frustrated opponents with a disciplined eight-meter defense and outstanding goal tending.

The BDLC grade 7/8 girls went 17-0 in N.J., including both Moorestown teams. The team's three losses came against top teams from N.Y., Conn. and Pa. in very competitive tournaments. The offense averaged almost 15 goals, while the defense allowed only three goals per league game. In the shorter tournament games, BDLC scored almost 10 per game, while allowing only six. The defense, led by Casey Gillespie, had two shutouts and held their opponents to three goals or less in 10 of their 20 games.
