## TOWN OF WESTFIELD 2012 BULK WASTE COLLECTION SCHEDULE

**HOW THE CLEANUP PROGRAM WORKS** **PERMIT REQUIRED**  
A permit is required at a cost of **\$80.00**. *The amount of material placed at the curbside cannot exceed 750 pounds per permit.* More than one permit can be obtained. The permit fees must be paid for at the time of registration. Each registrant will be issued a placard to be displayed in a window visible from the street. Neighbors may share a permit, but all material must be placed at the address of the designated permit holder. **Permit fees shall be non-refundable.**

### HOW TO OBTAIN A PERMIT

Please fill registration form out, detach it and either use the mail or in person registration as described below. The registration form can also be downloaded from the Town website at [www.westfieldnj.gov](http://www.westfieldnj.gov).

### Registration by Mail

Permits may be obtained through the mail and are to be postmarked no later than the following schedule:

Ward 4	May 25, 2012
Ward 1	June 1, 2012
Ward 2	June 8, 2012

Residents are to mail the completed registration form with a **check payable to "Town of Westfield" to the Department of Public Works, 959 North Avenue West, Westfield, NJ 07090, Attention: Residential cleanup. DO NOT SEND CASH.** Permits will be mailed back to the resident. Registrants should have a general idea of what they will be placing at curbside when they purchase the permit to determine whether they will need to purchase more than one permit.

### In Person Registration

Permits may also be obtained in person at the Westfield Public Works Center, 959 North Avenue, West. Residents are to complete the attached registration application and bring it to the above address along with a **check or money order** payable to the **Town of Westfield. Cash will not be accepted.** Permits will be sold in accordance with, **and not after**, the following schedule:
