## Dr. Robert Cardinale, 76, Practiced In Westfield and South Plainfield

Robert Cardinale, M.D. died on Thursday, November 22, 2012, at Beth Israel Medical Center in Newark at the age of 76.

Born and raised in Jersey City, he lived in Scotch Plains for the past 25 years. He also maintained a summer home in Lavallette, where he was a member of the Ocean Beach Shores Club and had served as the club president for 10 years.

Dr. Cardinale graduated from St. Peter's College in Jersey City in 1958 and earned his medical degree from the University of Padua, Italy in 1965. After

completing his residency in urology at UMDNJ, he maintained a practice in Westfield and South Plainfield. He also served as a medical doctor at East Jersey Prison and served as the prison medical director from 1983 to 1996.

Additionally, Dr. Cardinale was employed as a managed care specialist - as assistant medical director of American Preferred Provider Plans; medical director of Health Care Association IPA; medical director of Healthways HMO; and president-medical director of Health Care Associates IPA.

Dr. Cardinale was a longtime member of the National Guard, having started his military service in the New Jersey Air National Guard in 1954. He served as 1st Brigade Surgeon; 50th Medical Battalion Commander; 50th Armored Division Surgeon and New Jersey Army National Guard State Surgeon under General Vito Morgano. He retired as Grade Colonel (06) in 1994.

Surviving are his wife, Nancy; four children, Laura Fischer (Bill), Bobbilynn Gianfrancesco (Anthony), Robert James Cardinale and Chrissy Cardinale; his nephew, Anthony Cantale; and five grandchildren, Dax, Javen, Anthony, Jonathan and Gia. He was predeceased by his sister, Patricia Cantale.

## Union County Libraries' Food Drive Is Underway

AREA - The Union County Public Libraries are sponsoring a food drive now through Monday, December 17, during which libraries will accept donations of non-perishable food items to benefit the Community FoodBank of New Jersey and other local food pantries.

At the time of the report, no items appeared to have been taken
