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saw to it that the 0-9 Cardinals could not get the upper hand, limiting them to 81 rushing yards on 18 carries. Cardinal quarterback Jon Roldan completed 10 of 19 passes for 120 yards, but one was a result of a trick pitchout after a reception that resulted in a 55-yard TD run by Thomas Fabyan late in the fourth quarter.

SeniorlinebackerNick LaFace and junior linebacker Chris Sweeney, along with sophomore linebacker Jack Simcox and junior lineman Joe Scaglione, sacked Roldan four times in the first half for a net loss of 33 yards. Additionally, Sweeney and Anderson broke up a few of Roldan's passes.

"It's always good to win a game with defense. We did today. They had one big play, and they had one good drive. But we came out at halftime and got the ball on the kickoff. We didn't let up in the second half. We just kept it on them," Sweeney said.

The Blue Devils also did the job on special teams. On the opening kickoff of the second half, senior Ryan Esposito jarred the ball loose on the return and LaFace pounced

on the ball to give the Blue Devils possession on the Plainfield 30, which later enabled Salmon to kick his 21-yard field goal.

"Evan [Williams] or Ryan Esposito hit the ball then two players on our team missed it and it popped out, came to me and I fell on it," LaFace explained.

On the ensuing kickoff, LaFace delivered a cracking blow that stopped the return man dead in his tracks at the Plainfield 23.

"That felt good running down the field full speed and hitting somebody, just laying the hit on someone," LaFace said.

Two plays later, LaFace intercepted and returned the ball to the 14, which set up Salmon's third field goal of 20 yards.

"I thought I was going to score a touchdown. I was throwing a stiff arm," LaFace said.

Kane capped a five-play, 61-yard drive on the opening series of the game with his reception that turned into a 50-yard score with 10:42 on the clock.

"It was a great feeling! The hard work every day finally paid off. We did a throwback play. Everyone ran right and I ran left. Fortunately I was open. The safety bit and I scored," Kane explained.

Heavy pressure on the part of the Blue Devils' defense forced a botched punt attempt that resulted in a desperation incomplete pass. Westfield took over at the Plainfield four. After a penalty placed the ball on the two, Kane snagged Menares-Brown's pass in the end zone to make the score, 14-0. Kane's third

TD reception came just before the half, capping a 14-play, 74-yard drive to make the score 24-8.

"Those are little design plays, same type of thing as the throwback. They go one way. I go the other and I was just wide open," Kane said.

Just before the end of the first quarter, Salmon gave Westfield a 17-0 lead with his 22-yard field goal. Plainfield's first scoring drive covered 84 yards on a combination of five plays and five penalties, which ended with Jones' 35-yard TD run.

With the score sitting at 30-8, the Cardinals pulled off their trick play when Roldan tossed a short pass to Jones on the left, who then flicked to Fabyan, who sprinted down the sideline for the score. Fabyan ran in the two-point conversion with 2:17 remaining.

"I was going after the quarterback. I was on the ground when that happened, but we bounced back from big plays, and that's a good sign," Sweeney said.

Simcox ended any further thoughts of a Plainfield drive with an interception near midfield.

"It's a great way to end this season, especially with the seniors. It's very emotional, but it's a great way to go into next season," Kane said.

"You work together as a team. Winning or losing doesn't really matter. Playing together hard is what it's all about. We are a really young team," Sweeney said.

"It's a great way to go out. It felt good playing like that, dominating the whole game," LaFace said.

Cougars Gearing Up for Palisades Park

The Cranford High School football team is seeking its second straight North Jersey, Section 2, Group 3 championship, but first the Cougars need to prevail in their semifinals showdown with the Palisades Park/Leonia Tigers tomorrow night, Friday, November 30, at 7 p.m. at Memorial Field in Cranford.

On November 16 at Memorial Field, the second-seeded Cougars cruised to a 37-12 victory over the seventh-seeded South Plainfield Tigers. The Cougars chewed up 416 yards on the ground and added 33 yards in the air. Senior quarterback Reggie Green carried 27 times for 251 yards, including touchdowns runs of 16 yards and one yard, respectively, and threw for a third touchdown, a 14-yard completion to Bobby Bruns.

Senior running back Jimmy Dwyer blasted in for a two-yard touchdown, junior quarterback/defensive back John Oblachinski ran for a 12-yard touchdown and Troy Kettler booted a 27-yard field goal.

In their quarterfinal round, the Palisades Park/Leonia Tigers improved

to 8-2 with a 21-14 win over Rahway. The Indians took a 7-0 lead in the first quarter when Dante Raymond scored on a 51-yard sprint. Early in the second quarter Jeff Bost bashed in from one-yard out to give Rahway a 14-0 lead.

The Tigers awakened midway through the second quarter when quarterback Charles Simons scored on an 11-yard run, making the score, 14-7. With one minute remaining in the half, Simons knotted the score on a 15-yard touchdown run. The Tigers finalized the scoring in the third quarter when Adeyemi DaSilva pushed in from three-yards out.

Last year, the Cougars advanced to the sectional championship game with a 34-7 trouncing of the Colonia Patriots on November 19, 2011. The Cougars' first team defense held premier running back Greg Jones, who rushed for 450 yards in the previous game, to just 28 yards in the first half and 30 in the second before sending in the reserves.

Green had touchdown runs of 60 and 54 yards and totaled 192 yards on the ground. Kettler booted field goals

of 32 and 20 yards.

The Cougars went on to shut out favored Parsippany Hills, 27-0, for the championship at Kean University on December 3. Green engineered primarily a running game that netted 259 yards and four touchdowns, while the defense recorded three interceptions, six sacks, a fumble recovery and numerous bat downs or tipped passes.

Whitmer, two-time USA Academic All-American, earned the designation of NISCA/Speedo All-American (2010, 2011) and was a member of the All-Skyland Conference, All-Somerset County, and All-Non Public teams (2010, 2011, 2012). She holds N.J. independent school records in the 200-medley relay, 100-butterfly, and 400-freestyle relay.

Whitmer helped lead the Mount team to a NonPublic B State Championship during the 2010-2011 season and was a member of the record-breaking 200-medley relay team that won the Meet of Champions for the first time in school history.

GENERAL ORDINANCE NO. 1996 AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE CODE OF THE TOWN OF WESTFIELD, CHAPTER 20

Summary: This ordinance establishes a sewer fee for each property based on the uses of the property as classified on the Tax List District Summary for the period from January 1, 2013 through December 31, 2013; provides for a limited deduction for qualified senior citizens and permanently and totally disabled persons; and provides for the billing of said fee by February 20, 2013 and a due date for payment of April 1, 2013.

This ordinance is scheduled for adoption on December 11, 2012 at 8:00 p.m. or as soon thereafter as said matter can be reached in the Council Chambers, Municipal Building, 425 East Broad Street, Westfield, New Jersey, at which time and place any person who may be interested therein will be given an opportunity to be heard concerning said ordinance.
