Settlement With Exxon Mobil Environmental activists and opponents of the state's \$225-million settle-

ment with Exxon Mobil held a rally on the Statehouse steps last Thursday to vent their anger at Governor Chris Christie, politickernj.com reported. "I'm here today to say that we want

to send a very loud and clear message to Gov. Chris Christie: we want to stop this dirty deal," New Jersey Sierra Club Director Jeff Tittel said. "This settlement is a sell-out of New Jersey's environment. It is the largest corporate tax giveaway in history...It is so bad, and so dirty, that it's worse than the slime Exxon leaves on a wetland or stream when it's done spilling oil."

Exxon has squeezed all the juice out of the orange, and Governor Chris Christie has given away the score," Senator Raymond Lesniak (D-22nd, Elizabeth) said.

Barbara Buono Hit With ELEC

Complaint From '13 Campaign Former State Senator and gubernatorial candidate Barbara Buono has been hit with a complaint by the New Jersey's Election Law Enforcement Commission for illegally using her Senate campaign to pay for expenses on behalf of her 2013 gubernatorial bid, politickernj.com has reported.

According to the report, Ms. Buono is accused of "failing to establish separate candidate committees for the multiple offices sought during the 2013 primary election, and by making an expenditure on behalf of her gubernatorial candidacy through her senatorial account."

Expense reports show that Ms. Buono used her Senate campaign to pay \$37,250 to Myers Research & Strategies for a poll that, among other questions, asked voters about her gubernatorial candidacy, for which she had not yet set up a committee.

She later reimbursed the Senate account, but not until December of the following year, according to the report.

DeFillippo Loses Seat On County Dem Committee Charlotte Defilippo of Hillside, former long-time Union County Democratic Committee chairwoman, lost her seat on the county committee the Primary politickernj.com has reported.

Super PAC Established for Sweeney Run for Governor

Sean Kennedy, former aide to Senate President Stephen Sweeney (D-3rd, Gloucester), has begun a super Political Action Committee (PAC) called New Jerseyans for a Better Tomorrow to support "Democratic candidates for Governor in the State of New Jersey," NJ.com/Advance Media has reported.

Sen. Sweeney is considered a likely candidate for governor in 2016. N.J.Com/Advance Media also reported that a campaign consultant for Senator Ray Lesniak (D-20th, Elizabeth) created a PAC called "Run Ray Run" in support of the Senator's likely run for governor.

Casinos Proposed In North Jersey Could Hurt AC

A proposed state constitutional amendment currently before the State Legislature would expand casino gambling to three North Jersey locations, according to app.com. If the legislation passes it would go to voters as a ballot referendum.

One new casino in the Meadowlands would result in a 45 percent decline in revenues for Atlantic City, reported app.com, citing a study by the Casino Association of New Jersey.

Revenue from the casinos would in part go to redeveloping Atlantic City, which has been devastated by the downturn of its gambling industry due to competition from neighboring states.

Good Samaritans Would Not Have Ambul. Fees Under Bill

'Good Samaritans" would not have to pay ambulance fees if they are injured while providing emergency care to others involved in car accidents under a bill sponsored by Assemblyman Jay Webber (R-26th. Parsippany). The legislation, A-2403, has received Assembly Homeland Security and State Preparedness Committee approval.

Wait Time to Expunge Criminal Records Would Be Cut Under Bill

Legislation that makes changes to New Jersey eligibility requirements and procedures for expungement of criminal records was approved Monday by the Senate Budget and Appropriations Committee.

The bill, S-2663, would change the current law by shortening the waiting period required before records of a criminal conviction can be expunged from 10 years to five years. The legislation would also reduce the waiting period for those seeking to expunge a disorderly persons offense or petty conviction from five to three years. The bill is sponsored by Senator Ray Lesniak (D-20th, Elizabeth) and two other senators.

Cranford Plan. Bd. OK's **Lincoln Ave. Subdivision**

CRANFORD — The planning board last Wednesday approved, by a 7-to-1 vote, with the condition that a garage be razed, applicant Homaz, LLC's request for a minor subdivision to create two new, two-family homes with less than the minimum required lot width for lots that contain twofamily uses at 16 and 18 Lincoln Avenue West.

The two-family homes will be built between South Avenue and South Union Avenue. A minimum lot width of 70 feet is required where the proposed is 69.98 feet.

"I have a reservation regarding the onsite treatment (for flood control measures). I think the engineer should have been here for that...," Planning Board member Dan Aschenbach said when he voted against the application.

Cranford Township Engineer Carl O'Brien, who is hired as a part-time engineer from Maser Consulting for the township, was not present at the meeting. In the past, the planning board has voiced its concern with the engi-

neer not being present during application hearings.

The two-family homes would be located near South Avenue where the Garwood Brook lies, and Mr. Aschenbach said this area floods. He wanted more information on the flood-control plan for the application due to the fact that the area floods, he said.

James Watson of EKA Associates, a professional planner and land surveyor, said he did not design the seepage pit that was part of the application and could not testify on that portion of the application.

Mr. Watson said it met the minimum requirements of the township. Mr. Aschenbach's concern is those minimal requirements may not be adequate for areas that are known

The lots previously housed two, two-and-a-half-story dwellings, Mr. Watson said. What is being proposed is two, two-family homes.

N.J. Supreme Court Sides With Christie On Pension Ruling ues to make the largest responsible

TRENTON—In a 5-2 ruling Tuesday, the state's Supreme Court has sided with Governor Chris Christie by overturning a lower-court judge's order that told governor and the Legislature to work out a way to increase pension contributions for the current fiscal year, which ends June 30, according to a Associated Press report.

In Tuesday's ruling, the court determined there was not an enforceable contract to force the full pension payment, as unions had argued there was.

"That the state must get its financial house in order is plain. The need is compelling in respect of the state's ability to honor its compensation commitment to retired employees. But the Court cannot resolve that need in place of the political branches. They will have to deal with one another to forge a solution to the tenuous financial status of New Jersey's pension funding in a way that comports with the strictures of our Constitution," Justice Jaynee LaVecchia wrote on behalf of the majority.

In response to the ruling, Senate Minority Leader Tom Kean, Jr. (R-21st) released the following statement:

'It is time to move forward. I will work to ensure that the state continpension payment and to develop reforms to make the system solvent while protecting vital services, such as health and education, for all New Jerseyans. It is my expectation that all parties will now return to the table to negotiate a comprehensive solution to this issue."


