

Carol Lombardo to Retire As Dir. of Garwood Library

GARWOOD — Carol Lombardo will retire as director of the Garwood Public Library, effective July 1, 2015. Having served as director since being appointed in October of 1998, Mrs. Lombardo has brought the Garwood Library through many changes.

When she began her tenure as director, following the retirement of Madeline Ayres, the library was housed in the basement of the Franklin School, located near the corner of Walnut Street. The library was small, only 1,980 square feet, yet served both the general public and the school students since 1933.

When it was determined that Franklin School was to be torn down, Mrs. Lombardo and her staff had to put most of the books in storage while still maintaining library services. The library moved into a small building in JFK Plaza, keeping only the bare necessities to maintain a collection for the public, while keeping a small basement room in the school available for the books for the school population. Once the new school annex was built, the library staff moved all the books into the new larger quarters located at the back of the school complex on the corner of Walnut Street and Third Avenue, almost doubling the size of the library.

Under Mrs. Lombardo's supervision, the Garwood Library has grown exponentially in size and services. It has developed an extensive DVD collection, a large collection of audio-books, a growing number of large-print selections, a substantial young adult collection, and an e-book collection. The library also maintains a regular schedule of book clubs, story time for toddlers, an annual Summer Reading Club, once-a-week movies and a variety of monthly events and programs for all ages.

Before coming to the Garwood Library, Mrs. Lombardo was the library coordinator at St. Anne's Parochial School in Garwood for five years. Before that, she worked as a

senior library assistant at the Van Buren Branch Library in Newark, and was a senior receiving department clerk at the main branch of the Newark Public Library. She received her Master of Library Science degree from Rutgers University in 1997.

Once settled in the new building in 2005, Mrs. Lombardo and her staff established a web presence for the Garwood Library, including a Facebook page and Wi-Fi; developed new programs and expanded library services to the community, including home delivery to the elderly and disabled. Under her leadership, library circulation has more than doubled and the number of cardholders has increased dramatically. The library provides online catalog services, interlibrary loans and electronic resources that give Garwood Library cardholders access to a variety of information any time of the day or night.

Maryanne Duffy has been appointed as the new library director by the Garwood Library Board of Trustees. She has served as library assistant for 10 years at the Garwood Library.

Mrs. Lombardo will remain active in the library community. She also plans to travel and play golf, one of her most recent passions. "I'm retiring from my career — not from life. I plan to be active in the library and the community. I will, however, miss the day-to-day interaction with the wonderful library visitors and my great staff who over the years have become my friends," she remarked. "Libraries have always been part of my life and I don't see that changing anytime soon."

The Garwood Library Board of Trustees will honor Mrs. Lombardo at a farewell reception, open to the public, to be held on Saturday, June 27, from 10 a.m. to noon, at the library. The Garwood Public Library is located at the corner of Third Avenue and Walnut Street, behind the Lincoln School complex.

Alison Jaruzelski Earns Gold With Roots & Wings Project

WESTFIELD — Alison Jaruzelski, a junior at Westfield High School, received her Girl Scout Gold Award at the Girl Scouts Heart of New Jersey recognition ceremony on May 3. The highest honor in Girl Scouts, the Gold Award requires a minimum of 80 hours of researching, planning and executing a project that fulfills a community or national need.

Alison completed her Gold Award project with Roots & Wings, a non-profit organization that provides housing and transitional support to teens aging out of the foster care system. Roots & Wings provides safe housing and counseling to these teens, enabling them to complete their schooling and find employment on their way to self-sufficiency.

For her project, Alison was responsible for collecting donations for and setting up the first apartment leased by Roots & Wings in Union County. She hosted an apartment-warming shower for kitchen and bath accessories, bedlinens and school supplies last fall at the First Congregational Church of Westfield

that was attended by 50 people.

Alison also was charged with finding furniture for the two-bedroom apartment, including beds, desks, dressers, bookcases, lamps, a kitchen table and chairs. She solicited donations of gently used furniture through online registries and social media. Additionally, she wrote letters seeking donations of items that had to be in new condition, including mattresses and carpeting. Ron Shovlin of Shovlin Mattress Factory in Fanwood and Ben Slack of Major Mills in Clark were especially generous in contributing these key items.

After all the donations were gathered, the apartment was set up in less than one week from the time the keys were received until the first resident moved in. Alison was responsible for coordinating all the volunteers to help move, unpack and assemble the furnishings. The first two clients moved into the newly completed apartment last November.

As the final piece of her project, Alison compiled an apartment manual, including furnishing checklists, solicitation letters, photographs and a contact list of resources. The manual is now used by Roots & Wings as the template for setting up future apartments.

"In spite of all the work, it was very gratifying for me to be able to help other teens in my own community who have not had the benefits of a secure family life that so many of us take for granted," said Alison.

"Everyone I contacted about this project was so enthusiastic and so generous with their time and donations. I am especially grateful to the members of Roots & Wings Union County who devoted so much effort to help me move in and set up the apartment over one very busy weekend," she continued.

Alison, the daughter of Jennifer and Barry Jaruzelski, has been a member of Girl Scout Troop No. 40769 since kindergarten. Her mentor for the project was Wendy Masteller, a Roots & Wings board member and former science teacher at Westfield's Roosevelt Intermediate School.
