Tracts of South Ave. East Eyed As Possible Redevelopment Area

WESTFIELD — The town council Tuesday passed a resolution to recommend to the planning board to investigate whether to designate a strip on South Avenue as a non-condemnation redevelopment area. The properties to be investigated would be the following based on the block and lot information provided in the resolution:

418 South Avenue East owned by Westfield Crossing LLC, 421-429 South Avenue owned by Westfield Crossing LLC, 448 South Avenue East owned by Westfield Crossing

LLC (identified on Google maps as Sevell's Auto), 445-449 South Avenue owned by Beazer East Incorporated (TerraTherm on Google maps), 338 Windsor Avenue owned by Westfield Crossing LLC (shown as Sevell's Auto Body on Google maps.)

Town planner Don Sammet would conduct the investigation, which could take until about December, Town Administrator Jim Gildea said.

During a recent interview, Mrs. Walling explained that she was attracted to Mountainside because of its reputation as a close-knit community, which supports and values its public schools. She noted it is a district with an effective board of education, strong parental involvement and a highly engaged staff. Mrs. Walling expressed her appreciation for the administrators, staff, and custodians who have worked tirelessly over the summer to prepare for the start of the school year at Beechwood and Deerfield Elementary Schools and is looking forward to working with Berkeley Heights and other local districts as the school year begins.

Mrs. Walling comes to Mountain-

building," Ms. Mackey said.

The results of a leaf-collection survey showed 545 residents responded, Councilman David Contract said. Of the respondents, 53 percent were extremely satisfied with leaf collection, while 40 percent were not satisfied, Mr. Contract said.

He has recommended creating a leaf collection committee to study how to collect leaves in town. "We need to figure out a better way in Westfield," Mr. Contract stated. Currently, the town offers street side pickup of leaf piles that are to be put out on the street within one week of being collected.

Mayor Shelley Brindle suggested that the town possibly hire extra leafcollection staff during heavier leafcollection periods.

In regards to recycling, the town's conservation center collected more than 500 pounds of plastic bags, which earned the municipality a free park bench from Trex Company, Councilman Contract said. "Bring it clean and dry and it can be recycled," Mr. Contract said. Mayor Brindle suggested placing the bench in the Mindowaskin Park playground. The bench has a back on it, unlike the new benches which are designed backless to be handicapped accessible. The mayor said she had heard from some nursing moms and seniors who said they would prefer a bench with a back.

Also, starting next year, the town will only sell permits to the conserva-

tion center online. With school starting this week, school crossing guards have been attending training through the new company contracted to supply the guards to the town. "They still have a few spots to fill," Mr. Gildea said, further commenting that about three or four guards are needed. Of the guards who had been hired by the town previ-

Westfield's Full-Day Kinder Plans for \$12 Mil. Expansion

WESTFIELD — The board of education approved the next step for bringing full-day kindergarten to the district at its August 27 meeting. The preliminary building expansion plan presented at the meeting will be sent to the New Jersey Department of Education as an application for approval.

As previously reported in The Westfield Leader, current buildings do not provide enough space for a full-day kindergarten program; Jefferson Elementary School and Washington Elementary School were chosen for ex-

The proposed additions to Jefferson and Washington schools, as well as the previously upgraded Lincoln Early Childhood Center, will house the estimated 420 to 440 students for full-day Architect George Duthie, of Fraytak,

Veisz, Hopkins, Duthie, P.C., presented the project, including building plans, estimated costs and timeline.

According to Mr. Duthie, each school

will need an approximately 11,450square-foot expansion. Each addition will include nine classrooms with selfcontained toilet rooms, a mechanical room, a storage room and faculty restrooms. Some of the proposed classrooms in each building will have "flex space," Mr. Duthie stated, for special services or small-group instruction. The proposed budget for Jefferson School is \$5.85 million. Washington will cost approximately \$6.01 million due to the removal and reconstruction of the school's playground to make room for the expansion.

The total cost is an estimated \$11.86 million, which includes projected construction inflation for the next three years, furniture, utilities and security equipment and installation. It also includes regulatory agency fees, other fees and contingency funds.

"The project will be funded through the sale of bonds. The taxpayers will pay the debt on that bond," Mr. Duthie explained. He also stated that the project may qualify for financial support from CONTINUED ON PAGE 8

9/11 Memorial Events

Ceremonies and remembrance programs will take place next Wednesday, September 11, the 18th anniversary of the attacks on the World Trade Center, the Pentagon, and United Airlines Flight 93.

Scotch Plains — The annual memorial service will begin at 6 p.m. at the 9/11 Memorial Monument on the Alan M. Augustine Village Green, adjacent to the Scotch Plains Municipal Building on Park Avenue.

High School, is the new assistant principal at Roosevelt, filling the vacancy left when Mr. Gechtman was promoted.

"They are working well and are eager to have the staff arrive (on September 3) and then they are eager for the students to arrive [today],"Superintendent of Schools Margaret Dolan, Ed.D., said during an interview with The

Westfield Leader on Thursday.
Superintendent Dolan said the main focus of the summer by school officials was security.

We truly are fortunate that we have the Westfield Police Department, who has worked for years and continues to do so, as well as training from the New Jersey Department of Education on security, (which includes) up-to-date training on best practices (for school security)," she said.

In addition, the Union County Prosecutor's Office offers programs for school administrators. "They (law enforcement) are the ex-

perts in security and we really appreciate their efforts in working with us, answering our questions and making recommendations for the best way for us to secure our schools," she said.

The superintendent said this is not

only important during the school day, but after hours when various community groups are using the schools. "So that was an area of focus," she said.

Security changes were presented at the August 27 board of education meeting. She said following the board meeting she sent an email to all staff and parents announcing the security changes. School principals also have been sending out letters to parents.

A welcome video to parents includes security changes.

She said all staff have tags that they wear, which provide admittance to school buildings. Superintendent Dolan said access is "very specific," meaning a teacher only has access to the school building he or she teaches in during "specified hours and days of the year. Access is revoked once a staffer is no longer employed by the district.

Staff have been trained in lockdown situations, as evidenced last spring at Tamaques Elementary School after school hours when a man with a gun showed up to see his ex-girlfriend who is a teacher at the school. Superintendent Dolan said all school buildings also have panic buttons and staff can
