# Cougar Soccer Boys Envision Plenty of Potential Next Year

Growing pains existed, but this year's Cranford High School boys soccer team has been growing in a positive direction and envision plenty of potential for next year.

The Cougars struggled through a rugged season to finish with a 5-10-2 record, which included eight overtime games. In addition to playing their Union County Watchung Conference opponents, the Cougars also played Bernards and West Essex in non-conference games.

The Cougars' biggest victory came with a 4-1 road win over then undefeated, 7-0 Bernards.

"It was our third game in four days and the boys played extremely well. Bernards went on to win the state Group 2 championship, proving our team is not that far away from being very good," Cougar Head Coach Mike Curci said.

The Cougars lost to Union County Tournament semifinalist Linden twice by one goal and then beat them 1-0 on senior night at Memorial Field in one of their biggest games of the season.

"Senior goalkeeper Dan Weber had an outstanding game to earn the shutout under the lights at Memorial field," Coach Curci noted.

The Cougars also took a pair from the Plainfield Cardinals, 6-0 and 1-0.

Our biggest problem was inconsistency, mostly because of overall inexperience at the varsity level and missing some

golden opportunities on offense. Our record could easily have been 10-5 instead of 5-10. When we played a consistent 80 minutes of soccer, we could play with almost anyone," Coach Curci said.

Senior center midfielder George

assists, followed by senior attacker Jeff Francis (All-County Honorable Mention) and junior attacker Matt Aquiles (First Team All-Conference, Second Team All-County, All-State Honorable Mention) both with five goals and

Senior Andrew Schneider (All-County Honorable Mention) netted three goals and an assist. Junior midfielder Mike Kniazuk put in a goal and added two assists. Junior Tommy Paparatto contributed two goals. Another player, who will return next year is defender Michael Wielgus.

According to Coach Curci, "Paparatto returned late in the season from a season-long injury and will play a big role in the midfield. Junior Tom Fitzgerald, another starter who also missed most of the season with injury, will be a force, as well as Matt Aquiles and Mike Kniazuk."

Junior Jake Waleski (All-County Honorable mention) did a strong job at sweeper, and sophomore Andrew Gee (All-County Second Team, First Team All-Conference, All-State Honorable mention) proved to be a fine stopper. Ryan Wright and James Sands will also be returning on defense.

Among the many young players, who received valuable field time was freshman Marc Christiano, who according to Coach Curci, "continued to impress as

# Cougar Soccer Girls Made Significant Improvements

Rebuilding from scratch after a glorious 2009 season that included a Union County Tournament (UCT) championship and a 17-3-1 record with a senior-

heavy squad has required some patience on the part of Cranford High School girls soccer Head Coach Jen Michewicz and Assistant Coach Frank Vito.

With only one returning starter, the Lady Cougars played their youth and took their lumps in 2010, but this year they showed that they are definitely heading

in the right direction.

Last year, the Cougars were crunched, 4-0, by Scotch Plains-Fanwood, winners of five out of the past six UCT by the end of the year. This year, in their opening game of the season on September 8 in Scotch Plains, the Lady Cougars found out just how much they did improve when battled

the Raiders down to the wire, losing 1-0. Additionally, the Cougars had a strong offensive push in the final 10 minutes. The Raiders later went on to win another UCT title.

In that game, the Raiders took six good shots on goal in the first half, but Cougar goalkeeper Leah Quinn made four fine saves. Quinn

demonstrated even more flare in the second half when smothered a pair of vicious shots off the foot of Raider Christy Monroy. But her best was yet to come when she blocked a point-blank shot launched by Leah Salituro, the Raiders' leading goal scorer.

The Cougars did finish the sea-

son with four wins and two ties, but eight of their losses were by just one goal.

"Our record doesn't reflect the intensity of our schedule, having to play the top six teams in the county each twice. We had four overtime games, five shut outs, and eight games lost by only one goal, a significant improvement from last year," noted Coach Michewicz.

One of those one-goal losses came in a closely contested battle with the Summit Hilltoppers at Memorial Field in Cranford on October 11. One breakaway run that resulted in a goal 10 minutes into the second half was all that was needed for the visiting Hilltoppers to earn a 1-0 victory.

The Lady Cougars got strong efforts from defenders Annie Vollenbroek Rachel Romano and

Hannah DeMars, and Quinn stopped one Summit attempt in the second half and made a smart decision later by charging and smothering a loose ball near the right corner of the box before a Hilltopper could get a foot on it. Defender Kristina Sosa added a fine slide check later to prevent a Hilltopper breakaway.

"Leah Quinn was phenomenal in goal. Rachel Romano led the defense," Coach Michewicz said.

Before any scoring took place, the pace of the game could have leaned in the Cougars' direction when Taylor Pace charged down the middle and launched a wicked shot that the Hilltopper goalkeeper got just enough hand on to deflect the ball over the crossbar.

Senior co-captains/midfielders Emily Lupin and Madison Savulich were always quite active and

helped control the midfield, and senior forward Danielle Jakubik continuously put pressure on the opposition's backfield. Others who contributed defensively were seniors Hannah Dowzycki, Shannon Maher and Cara Costa.

According to Coach Michewicz, some of the season's highlights include taking the county runner up team, Westfield, into overtime, their wins over A.L. Johnson and one over Summit, and losing to county champions (Scotch Plains-Fanwood) 1-0 during a hard fought game.

"The girls were competitive dedicated and perseverant, always ready to face their next challenge. The seniors have inspired the underclassmen, who are looking to build on this year's improvement next year," Coach Michewicz said.

## CF Mayor Urges Opposition to Birchwood Dev.

CRANFORD — Township Mayor Daniel Aschenbach said on Tuesday that the online petition opposing a proposed development on Birchwood Avenue has garnered more than 100 comments from residents, and said the deadline for signing the petition will be next week so that he can take the document to Trenton and present it to Governor Chris Christie and other state officials.

"Cranford is not going to stand for this type of overdevelopment," the mayor said at Tuesday's township committee meeting. The petition, which can be found at [change.org/petitions/oppose-birchwood-overdevelopment](http://change.org/petitions/oppose-birchwood-overdevelopment), allows residents to not only register their opposition to the proposed plan, but also includes com-

ments on why they are signing the petition that opposes the plan for the development of 360 residential units.

The Army Corps of Engineers has said the property would be "beneficial" as a retention basin for heavy rain water, the mayor said, and would help alleviate flooding problems on Casino Avenue, North Union Avenue and Wadsworth Terrace. He noted there is state funding available for water retention projects and suggested that if the entire property is not needed for a retention basin, part of it could be used for senior citizen housing.

In a related matter, the mayor said he had met recently with mayors of other communities along the Rahway River to consider potential water storage sites along the river to alleviate potential flooding problems during future storms.

Commissioner David Robinson, who will become

mayor on January 1 when control of the township committee passes to the Republicans, emphasized that the 2012 committee will be "equally unified" in opposition to the Birchwood Avenue development.

In other business, Mayor Aschenbach said that PSE&G officials are formulating a plan to relocate the South Avenue substation that flooded during Hurricane Irene and led to a multi-day power outage in Cranford and parts of surrounding communities. A special meeting will be held on Monday, December 5, during which the mayor's task force on the future of the municipal building — which was seriously damaged by the flooding in late August — will present its recommendations. The mayor also asked residents for their "patience" as the township works to pick up debris from the October 29 snowstorm. "We're behind on that," the mayor said, and he urged residents to bring "what they can" to the conservation center.

Tuesday's meeting was the last for Commissioner Mark Dugan, who did not seek re-election, and his fellow governing body members paid tribute to him at the end of the hour-long meeting. Mr. Dugan said it had been "an honor to serve this community." Committee members also paid tribute to Barbara Krause upon her retirement from the local airplane noise advisory committee.

At the start of the meeting, after eight members of Junior Girl Scout Troop 40113 led the flag salute, Mayor Aschenbach presented a certificate of appreciation to the Garwood Knights of Columbus for the group's assistance in the post-Hurricane Irene recovery in late August and early September.

# Garwood to Open Bids for Athletic Complex Contract

GARWOOD — After a long debate among the governing body this year following a change from Democrat to Republican-controlled governing body, the borough is getting set to open bids for contractors interested in the athletic field project contract.

At the borough council's November 22 meeting, Councilman Louis Petruzzelli said 30 bids went out for the athletic field complex and that the council was to open bids on November 29. There was a mandatory pre-bid meeting with the prospective contractors on November 9.

On another matter, the council had discussed earlier in the year to buy a new snow removal vehicle. Councilman Keith Sluka said the council's Streets and Roads Committee has decided not to pursue the purchase this year.

"It is an item we would have to bond for. By the time that happens we are in the snow season," he said.

Councilman Jim Mathieu said, the chairman on the finance committee, said the borough is "looking to find something to double as field maintenance (equipment) for the athletic field complex. He said the vehicles ranged in cost from \$14,000 to 17,000.

At last week's meeting council members voted to adopt the consent agenda, which included authorizing upgrades of salary levels for three patrolman, five

grants awarded to be deposited in the 2011 municipal budget, amending the agreement with Musial Group, the architectural firm hired for the athletic field complex, and authorizing the borough clerk to prepare a request for proposals for borough attorney, planner and engineering services for the planning board.

The council also approved an annual maintenance agreement with SBP Industries for the firehouse generator at a cost of \$450 plus wattage.

The Garwood Board of Health is seeking a new member, Councilwoman Sara Todisco said during her Public Health committee report.

In addition, Mayor Patricia Quattrocchi honored Keith Gallagher, church and community activities chairman for the Garwood Knights of Columbus, with an award for his leadership in Hurricane Irene support efforts in the borough. He was able to gather five truckloads of food with help from students and scouts and \$1,200 in gift cards for people displaced by the hurricane.

## Search Continues for Killer of Former Cranford Woman

UNION — One year after she was discovered inside her Union Township home, the Union County Homicide Task Force continues to investigate the circumstances behind the stabbing death of Diane Mary Zaleski, 54, inside her Laurana Road home in Union. Her body was discovered on November 18, 2010 by family members.

Ms. Zaleski suffered multiple injuries in the attack that led to her death, according to a report from the medical examiner. Over the course of the last year, the case has remained a priority for the Homicide Task Force and the Union Township Police Department.

Born in Elizabeth, Ms. Zaleski moved to Union 20 years from Cranford. She was a legal secretary for Schering Plough Corp. in Kenilworth for 17 years, retiring one year ago.

Over the last 12 months, members of the Task Force have consulted members of the FBI's Behavioral Analysis Unit to help identify who might have murdered Ms. Zaleski. Given the forensic evidence recovered and analyzed, the Task Force is looking for a male suspect.

Nearly 100 people have been interviewed and more than 80 men have been cleared as potential suspects, in some cases by use of forensic testing.

"The fact is that Ms. Zaleski was a very cautious person and was not in the habit of opening her door to strangers. Through interviews we have learned that she was even hesitant to open her door after dark to people she did know," Mr. Romankow said. "There were no signs of forced entry to her house, so it is possible and likely that Ms. Zaleski knew her killer."

As the anniversary of her death approaches, investigators are again appealing to the general public as well as friends, acquaintances, and the Zaleski family to recall the days before and after she was killed, in the hopes that a memory or credible piece of information will be recalled.

Forensic evidence was recovered at the scene that shows the

suspect likely suffered a cut on the hand or arm during the attack — including one that likely required at least the use of a band-aid. There were also likely defensive wounds in the form of scratches.

"No matter how small an inkling, if there is someone who feels like they have information that can solve this case and give the family

peace of mind, we urge them to come forward," Mr. Romankow said. "A simple forensic test can exclude suspects quickly."

After the murder the killer remained at Ms. Zaleski's house for several hours and attempted to use her credit card to purchase two specific electronic items, including a MacBook computer and an iPad. The transaction was denied twice.

## Garwood Library Among Food Drive Participants
