DELMAR & DON PATTERSON PAD THE END ZONES

Raiders Rise to 5th Straight, Make Shabazz Fall, 14-7

Delmar and Donald Patterson provided the offensive punch and the defensive line yielded some yardage, but held when it counted as the Scotch Plains-Fanwood High School football team kicked their record to 5-0 when they stopped Malcolm X. Shabazz High School, 14-7, in Scotch Plains on October 25.

The Raider defense was stubborn from the start. Shabazz received the opening kickoff and were unable to move the ball on their first series of downs. Although not as stubborn, the Bulldog defense stopped the Raiders' offense after nine plays and the Bulldogs got the football on their own 14.

Neither team could make any major advancements in the first quarter. The Raiders got the ball at their own 44. Delmar Patterson swept right for a 10-yard gain, La'Marr McDaniel blasted forward for five yards, then quarterback Eddie Williams curled left for 10 yards at the Shabazz 34.

McDaniel slanted left for a nine-yard gain, then carried the ball again to the 17 for an eight-yard gain. Williams hooked right for another nine yards to put the ball on the eight-yard line, then Delmar Patterson sliced through the middle of the Bulldog line for the first touchdown.

Adam Baumwoll added the extra point and the Raiders led, 7-0, with 9:23 left in the half.

The next big break for the Raiders came when the Bulldogs fumbled on second down on their own 27 and the football was smothered by junior James Feeley. After the Raiders suffered a four-

yard loss on first down, Williams drilled a pass to Don Patterson in the end zone to boost their lead to 13-0 with 7:43 remaining in the half. Baumwoll tacked on the extra point.

Sophomore lineman Dan Loomis, who had been terrorizing Bulldog halfback Karrii Little throughout the first

HAWKS FLIES LIKE AN EAGLE ON KICK RETURNS

Minutemen's Aerial Assault Downs the Blue Devils, 31-14

The fourth-ranked Elizabeth High School football team continued to click on its passing game while stepping up its defensive game which shut down Westfield High School's running game in the second half and secured a 31-14 victory in Elizabeth on October 24.

The Blue Devils ruled the ground, outrushing the Minutemen 152-115, but could not defend themselves from the awesome aerial attack performed by quarterback Asad Abdul-Kaliq who tossed over 30 passes to amass 367 in the air.

Elizabeth went right to work as Jakeem Stockling took the kickoff on his own three and returned the football to the 22. After moving the ball to the 34, Abdul-Kaliq fired a pass 15 yards to Abdul McCrary who was near the left sideline. From there McCrary dashed to the end zone to finalize a 66-yard touchdown

play. Vito Mazza's extra point attempt was good and, with 10:08 left in the first quarter, The Minutemen led 7-0.

The Blue Devils ran six plays and were forced to punt. Punter Bob Baykowski booted the football 49 yards to get the Blue Devils out of jeopardy.

The Blue Devils and the Minutemen exchanged possession a few times for the remainder of the first quarter. During that time, Jason Osborne had a 22-yard run and Lamont Turner made a diving interception at the Elizabeth 43-yard line.

After holding the Blue Devils, the Minutemen went right to their aerial attack and found the end zone when Abdul-Kaliq hit Stockling with a 20-yard pass. Mazza's extra point kick was good and the score increased to 14-0 with 9:42 left in the half.

On the kickoff, Rasheed Hawks grabbed the ball on the 20 and flew 37 yards to the Elizabeth 43, giving the Blue Devils good field position. Gains of nine

and 11 yards by Tom Lee and a nine-yard gain by Jason Osborne eventually put the Blue Devils on the four-yard line. From there, Lee bashed his way to within six-inches of the goal line. On the next play, Lee slashed into the end zone, Jason Krieger added the extra point and with 4:56 left in the half, the score tightened to 14-7.

Minuteman Billy Gilbert dropped the ball on the eight on the kickoff, picked it up, started to run, then was knocked out-of-bounds at the 10. The stubborn Blue Devil held on four plays and the minutemen had to give up possession.

Hawks snatched up the football on his own 40, hooked right and glided down the sideline to the Minutemen's seven. Two plays later, Turner slanted to his right and captured another touchdown for the Blue Devils. Krieger's kick was good and the score was knotted, 14-14, with 2:22 remaining in the half.

When things appeared to be getting under control, the Minutemen pulled off a slick screen pass to fullback Peter Czajkowski who then barreled 54 yards to the Westfield 15. Several plays later, with

CARDINAL FLIES HIGH WITH 2 Ruthless Raiders Reap Farmers' Harvest, 7-0

The Scotch Plains-Fanwood boys' soccer team, ranked No. 2 by The Star Ledger demonstrated their vast talent by crushing Union High School, 7-0, in Scotch Plains on October 23.

Senior Chris Cardinal was soaring as he softened the Farmers' turf by providing a devastating aerial attack, scoring two goals and setting up two assists.

The remainder of the Raiders terrorized the Farmers on the ground by trampling on their turf all afternoon. Seldom did the Farmers have the opportunity to expand their acreage as they were under constant siege by the invading Raiders.

After the Raiders tallied four goals in the first half, senior Tri-Captain Mike Milberger, took a direct kick and lined it into the Farmers' net with less than five

minutes off the clock. Milberger's paralyzing shot left the Farmer goalie motionless.

The specter of doom shadowed the Farmers and all they could do was play defensively for the remainder of the game as the Raiders powdered shot-after-shot at the goal.

Milberger ended up with two goals and teammates Ted Sweeney, Todd Moser and Chris DeSantis gathered one apiece. Moser's goal was his 12th of the season.

Highly regarded goalkeeper Jeff Gillie chalked up his 10th shutout of the season in an easy fashion as he needed only to reject two Farmers' attempts on the Raider heartland.

The Raiders boosted their record to 14-1-1 while the Farmers sunk to 3-10-2.

The Westfield High School varsity field hockey team continued its winning ways by defeating Cranford High School, 2-0, on October 20 and Middlesex High School, 7-0, on October 24.
After suffering a disappointing tie to Cranford the week before, the Devils came out ready to win at home in their last game against Cranford in regular season play.
"Cranford was one of the only opponents that beat us freshman year. After that loss we made a pact. A pact saying that no matter what happened, we'd beat them, as a team, our senior year. Westfield field hockey never breaks a promise," said senior Kit Simons.
After the first half, however, it seemed the game may end the same way as the first match up, with neither team finding the goal. Ten minutes into the second half, Westfield finally made the first move when junior Allie Cook brought the ball up the right side of the field and made a cross to the center. Senior Jessica Brewster was there to sweep the cross past the goalie to take to lead.
Cranford almost came back with a tie minutes later, when a shot bounced off the left post, but Westfield managed to keep the ball out of their cage.
Senior Christine Giameo scored the final goal with fifteen minutes left to play off an assist from senior halfback Anisha Ambaradar.
"I was extremely happy with our victory and I'm glad I was able to contribute

to our win," said Giameo.
"Our team really pulled together to beat Cranford. It was one of our greatest victories, and a goal we've been striving for since freshman year," said senior Sarah Chance.
Westfield moved on to Middlesex on Friday, and came away with a 7-0 victory there. The first goal came within the first three minutes of play. Senior Meghan Hely sent the pass in on a corner play, and Cook wound up and shot a rocket through the legs of the Middlesex goalie.
With ten minutes left to play, Brewster sent a rebound off the goalie's pads into the corner to end the scoring in the first half.
Westfield came out even stronger in the second half to put in five more goals. They got off to a quick start, with senior Shannon Wagner sending a clear shot into the left corner two minutes into the half. Five minutes later, Hely sent a rebound in to bring the score to 4-0.

Raider Girls Paralyze Westfield in Counties

Senior Tri-Captain Amy Citrano redirected a cross from freshman forward Renee Zidonik and ricocheted the ball off the left post and into the net with only two minutes off the clock to give the Scotch Plains-Fanwood girls' soccer team the only score of the game which resulted in a shocking upset of the top-seeded Blue Devils in the quarterfinals of the Union County Tournament in Westfield on October 25.
The Raiders went into the game as the ninth-seeded team and the Blue Devil girls have been the defending champions three years in-a-row. It was the first time the Raiders have beaten the Blue Devils since 1984 when they defeated them in a New Jersey State tournament game. That just happened to be the only other time the Raider girls had ever beaten the Blue Devils.
The Blue Devils have lost only two Union County Tournament games in its history, the first was to Union Catholic in the 1993 final game.
Junior keeper Christine Bowers rejected 15 Blue Devil attempts on goal in recording her seventh shutout of the sea-

son. Blue Devil goalie Vicky Nusse stopped 10 shots-on-goal.
A very pleased Raider girls soccer Head Coach Frank Butz commented about the performance, "Our girls went into the game as healthy as they had been all year. Jen Miller is finally back after being injured and Katy Baker had injured her ankle."
Butz continued, "We were ready to play and the early goal just got them more fired up. Westfield didn't get many clean shots at the goal."
When asked about the Raiders' performance in the last six games, Butz explained, "We have only given up one goal in the last six games. We have been tough defensively. Recently our girls have been more aggressive and have been beating the opponents to the ball. The last three weeks, we have been playing better and better."
The Raider girls have not lost in their last six outings and improved their record to 8-6-1. Westfield slipped to 13-3-1. The Raiders will play A. L. Johnson on Friday, October 31 in Union at 7 p.m..
