A Column Written by Local High School Students

On June 12, President Donald Trump became the first U.S. President to ever sit down with a leader of North Korea, currently led by Kim Jong-un.

Not to my surprise, I rarely heard any positive reactions to President Trump's impressive accomplishment.

Westfield is quickly transitioning into a Democratic town, with the recent election of only the second Democratic mayor in Westfield's history. Granted, I would consider myself a socially liberal person, in that I support gay marriage, I'm pro-choice and that I believe in racial equality. However, from a political standpoint, I have very Republican views.

Whenever politics is brought up among my friend group or in a class, it feels like I always hear about how awful President Trump is, and how he is failing as President, and how his supporters must be insane, immoral Americans. This makes me, a once proud Republican, feel ashamed — and ignorant even — of my political views.

In today's society, being Republican is complicated. Once you say you're a Republican — or use the word conservative — people assume the worst. It feels as if they assume that you are racist, homophobic, or to make it more timely, that you support separating families at the Mexican-American border.

This could not be further from the truth, for me. But, with the countless negative connotations that accompany being Republican today — specifically in current-day Westfield — it's hard to not feel ashamed of my political views.

I have had numerous conversations with my fellow high school students, who I know share the same political views as

me, about what it's like being a Republican in Westfield High School (WHS). We always share the same responses, saying that we're often times afraid of the judgment that we would receive if we were open about our beliefs.

I can vividly recall being asked "Are you a Republican?" and having to hesitate in my response as I wasn't sure if I was in the mood to be looked down upon for simply saying "yes."

This is extremely disheartening. I shouldn't have to live in constant fear of people's reactions to my political beliefs. I shouldn't have to worry about losing friends or losing people's respect if they heard I was a Republican. But most importantly, I shouldn't have to stress explaining to people how just because I'm a Republican, doesn't mean I'm closed-minded.

However, this is a tricky slope to navigate in WHS. High school in general is a difficult place to maneuver. It's a time in teenagers' lives when they are developing their own identity, and along with that development, they are discovering their own, individual beliefs on worldly issues relating to politics. This period of time's difficulty is only amplified by current societal conditions.

The stigma that surrounds being Republican is extremely problematic as it makes many young people, myself included, afraid to embrace our own beliefs.

The stigma surrounding being a young Republican is daunting, and in WHS, I personally feel its repercussions firsthand. I, a Westfield resident since birth, have never felt afraid to express my beliefs until the 2016 U.S. Presidential election happened. And over the previous years, this fear has only been amplified by the increasing judgment I feel when admitting to my peers that I'm a Republican.

If today's youth is led to believe that the risks of asserting their own opinions are greater than the rewards, the very principles of American democracy will be lost. Society as a whole needs to learn to embrace differing opinions, and work together to find sufficient solutions to pressing issues, or else the foundation of our great country will be threatened. And I wholeheartedly believe that this idea of acceptance of all beliefs start at a smaller level, such as starting in WHS.

TOWNSHIP OF CRANFORD ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

TAKE NOTICE that on the 9th day of July, the Zoning Board of the Township of Cranford, in the County of Union took the following actions:

1. **Application ZBA - 18-014:** Adopted a Resolution of Memorialization approving the request for preliminary and final subdivision, site plan, use and bulk variance approvals. The applicant is requesting 2 "D" variances, 9 "C" variances and 8 design waivers. The applicant proposes to construct an additional warehouse facility on Lot 6.01, and to subdivide Lot 6.01 into two parcels, here referred to as Lots 6.01A and 6.01B. Lots 2 and 3 will be merged into Lot 6.01A. Lot 6.01A will continue to house the existing warehouse facility. The Applicant will construct the new warehouse facility on Lot 6.01B on Block 640 Lots 2, 3, and 6.01 as designated on the Township Tax Map, also known as 677 and 679 Raritan Road and 40 Jackson Drive, in the NC and C-1 Zones.

2. **Application ZBA - 18-016:** Granted approval to Fairview Manor, LLC/Dreyers Farm, applicant, for preliminary and final site plan approval. The applicant is also applying for a pergola in the front of the farm stand building, storm water improvements (including a water quality treatment device and installing a 24 inch CMP slotted drain in the front of the property), paving the previously approved gravel parking lot, ADA aisle striping and signage, the addition of a gravel area and path to the existing buildings and greenhouses on Block 151 Lot 14 as designated on the Township Tax Map, also known as 831 Springfield Avenue in

the R-1 and R-3 Zones. The applicant is not applying for any variance relief.

3. **Application ZBA-18-015:** Granted approval to Five Aces Resources LLC and Jola Resources LLC, applicant, for preliminary and final minor site plan approval, and C-1, C-2 and D-3 variances to construct a two-story office building, including possible partial professional or medical offices, in the NC Zone. The property is in a split zone - NC and C-1. Offices are a conditional use in the NC zone and this application meets all the conditions. The proposal will exceed the maximum impervious coverage of 75 percent in the NC zone, while 82.2 percent is proposed. The existing coverage is 80 percent. The C-variances are required for parking and a waiver is requested for parking setbacks. (\$255-26G(3)(a). The parking is proposed behind the building, however being that the property is on a corner lot, the parking is located inside the required setback area of 15 feet for two streets, McKinley Street and Commerce Drive (the property is bordered by three streets). Therefore, a design waiver is required. The applicant is requesting a variance for 4 parking spaces for the flexibility of possibly placing a medical office use at some point in the future. The last variance requested is for side yard setback where 10.3 feet is proposed and 12 feet is required. (\$255 Attachment 1, Schedule 1) on Block 642 Lot 8 and Block 642 Lot 9 as designated on the Township Tax Map also known as 643 Raritan Road and McKinley Street in the NC and C-1 Zones.
