## This Year's BOE Ballot Will Look A Bit Differently Than In The Past

My name is Mark Friedman and I am a former two-term school board member in Westfield. I am writing today to demonstrate my support for incumbents Gretchan Ohlig, Robert Garrison and Charles Ostroff. Please vote for them on Tuesday, November 6 so they can continue to work on behalf of all of the residents of Westfield.

This year's ballot will look a bit differently than in the past. The rules are the same. You can vote for up to three candidates. You choose them all individually, not as part of any ticket, so although you will see columns on the ballot, you do not need to choose a column in its entirety.

During my terms on the board, I watched Gretchen, Rob and Charles participate in the tough decisions that sometimes need to be made. They have done so, only after gathering as much information as possible, listening to the various points of view and then being decisive in their conviction.

The role of a board member is to govern and set policy. The role is not to run the district, as new candidates often believe. You are there to establish new policy, if necessary, and to insure that the administration is adhering to the policies that have been established. You are there to provide support and guidance for the administration, but also to challenge, where necessary and not just because you can.

One of the most significant criteria of serving is being able to establish strong trust between the administration and the board. I am highly confident, having seen them first-hand, that the working relationship between the incumbents and the administration is quite strong. Without this trust, the free flow of information from the administration to the board simply will not happen, which in turn makes moving the district forward, even more difficult.

If you are not aware, here are some accomplishments of the current board on which, Ohlig, Garrison and Ostroff par-

tipitate.

Under the leadership of board members and the business administrator, they instituted a culture of fiscal responsibility in recognition that our taxpayers fund almost all, 93 percent, of our \$106 million budget. Over the last six years, the reserves that a district can maintain has grown dramatically, which has allowed the district to undertake a number of capital projects, both big and small, without asking the taxpayers for additional money. They have self-insured health insurance to minimize health insurance increases and the corresponding impact on the budget.

With respect to curriculum, our instructional technology program has been called "a model of education" by officials from the NJDOE. As part of the ambitious technology initiative, not only has the board invested in hardware, software, and the development of a new website, but they created Master Tech teacher positions so that our teachers have support when infusing the technology into their lessons. They have also implemented new language arts and science curricula and expanded STEM opportunities.

With respect to safety and security, they have engaged school security experts to examine each of our facilities and our procedures for school emergencies. They have invested funds to make changes at buildings (i.e. replacing all doors in the school over the next two summers) and have funded two additional school resource officers at the intermediate schools. They have updated our procedures and administrators and meet regularly with staff to review. They have created a crisis communication plan so that we are consistent in our communication of incidents to parents — reduce stress on parents and set expectation so we do not have parents driving to schools that are on lock down and creating additional issues.

I should also point out that Gretchan Ohlig is the current board president and in that role, she has conducted herself with poise and great confidence as a leader. She is the conduit between the administration, the board and the staff. She has served on just about all of the committees that make up the board. Charles Ostroff is the current chairman of the finance committee, a position that he took on after I left the board. By all indications, Charles is continuing on the strong foundation that I believe we built during my six years. Robert Garrison is the chairman of the legislation committee and sits on the finance and negotiations committee. Although there is always more to learn, by virtue of the fact that they all have three years or more of experience, this will allow the board to continue to function, immediately, at 100 percent capacity.

Please join me in supporting Ohlig, Garrison and Ostroff on Tuesday, November 6.

WESTFIELD—The Westfield Board of Education Candidates' Night, sponsored by the Parent Teacher Council, is now available to view in its entirety in the board election folder on the Westfield Public Schools website at [www.westfieldnj12.org](http://www.westfieldnj12.org).

The Candidates' Night recording also will air on Blue Devil Television Channel 36 through November 7 on Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Saturdays at 11 a.m., 1 p.m., 5 p.m. and 10 p.m. On Sundays, it will be shown at 1 p.m.

The following Westfield residents have

declared their candidacy for three seats on the board of education: Dennis Cariello, Simon Cirasa, Robert Garrison, Gretchan Ohlig, Tara Oporto, and Charles Ostroff. The election will be held this Tuesday, November 6.

Due to a change in New Jersey school election law, this year's ballot for the November 6 election will contain columns with some candidates bracketed together. Voters can choose up to three candidates individually and do not need to select a column in its entirety.

## I Will Be Supporting Ileen Cuccaro For Mayor Of The Boro Of Garwood

On February, 2014, a very poorly written ordinance submitted to the mayor and council of the Boro of Garwood was hastily pushed thru despite resident input during the February 11, 2014 council meeting. Ordinance 14-03 was put in place to prevent corner property owners in Garwood from erecting a non-picket fence, above four feet, past the cornerstone of the main structure on their property.

Why would an ordinance such as this be imposed upon corner property owners and taxpayers? The sad reason is that one or two members of the Boro of Garwood planning board did not like

the visuals. The concern should have actually been for the safety and privacy of the corner property owner.

Ordinance 14-03 was eventually amended, however, only for corner properties having a swimming pool. Corner property owners who did not have a swimming pool on their properties were not permitted anything more than a picket type fence, no more than four feet in height. No "grandfather clause" was put into place either to protect those corner property owners who had an existing six-foot fence on their property.

Prior to Ileen Cuccaro being elected to council in 2016, any further adjustment to this ordinance fell on deaf ears. Councilwoman Cuccaro reintroduced the ordinance to be adjusted for all corner property owners, not only corner property owners with swimming pools. Despite many roadblocks and time delays, Councilwoman Cuccaro never gave up on adjusting this ordinance. She refused to allow this ordinance to remain an issue for corner property owners. Her tenacity and ability to follow thru with this issue eventually led to the reversal of this ordinance for all corner property owners.

I would like to also give credit to the other members of council for their vote in reversing ordinance 14-03, however, had it not been for the initial efforts put forth directly by Councilwoman Cuccaro, all corner property owners would today be facing the loss of their rights upon their corner properties.

As I believe that actions speak louder than words, I will be supporting Ileen Cuccaro for mayor of the Boro of Garwood during the upcoming 2018 election.

There are almost no words to describe what they say in their campaign literature — that Sara Todisco has "resorted to Smears, Lies and Fear..." a reference to an "allegedly corrupt system," that the Todisco campaign is supported and funded by a "Far-Left Hate Group," and more.
