Bill Banning 'Ghost Guns' Passed By State Senate

TRENTON - Legislation authored by Senator Joe Cryan (D-20th, Union) and Senator Nick Scutari (D-22nd, Linden) that would ban "ghost guns" that are assembled with untraceable gun components was approved to include plastic guns created by 3-D printers and then approved by the Senate today and sent to the governor. If enacted, it would be the strongest law in the country on ghost guns and on weapons made by 3-D printers, according to a New Jersey Senate Democrats press release.

According to the release, the legislation, S-2465/A-3129, aims to stop the illegal assembly of firearms from parts with no serial numbers or other identifying characteristics, ban all undetectable gun components, prohibit the dissemination of programming files used by 3-D printers to make guns and expand the legal definition of "firearms" to make sure that all gun parts are regulated.

"The dark side of new technologies is that people can make firearms at home that are undetectable and untraceable," said Senator Cryan, (D-Union) the former Union County sheriff.

"This allows people who are a danger to others or themselves to get their hands on firearms, including felons, people with mental illnesses or those who have been convicted of domestic violence. Our laws need to be updated to keep pace with new technologies and methods that allow the unchecked spread of these lethal weapons."

The bill would make the purchase of firearm parts to illegally manufacture an untraceable firearm a third-degree crime, punishable by a three-to-five year term of incarceration, a fine of up to \$15,000, or both.

The bill was approved by a Senate vote of 31-0 after the measure was passed in the Assembly, 68-5-3.

WAYVE Able to Provide New Year of Programming

WESTFIELD - WAYVE (Westfield Area Youth Volunteer Experience) is a program that provides youth in Westfield and surrounding areas with quality volunteer opportunities. A second year of programming has been made possible through a \$30,000 grant from the Westfield Foundation to Jewish Family Service of Central New Jersey.

Last year, WAYVE engaged more than 100 volunteers who performed 245 hours of volunteer services including partnering with Bonds of Courage in a Box Brigade at the Westfield Armory, cleaning up Nomahegan Park, starting a Legacy Project with Westfield Senior Housing, offering a Technology Workshop to older adults at the Lavy House in Westfield, tutoring disadvantaged students at the Westfield Neighborhood Council, and distributing food from the JFS Food Pantry.

The mission of WAYVE is to match agencies and individuals in need of volunteers with enthusiastic teens and young adults looking to enrich their lives through volunteerism. Health Literacy Tote Bags Are Available at Library

WESTFIELD - The Libraries of Union County Consortium (LUCC) has partnered with the Overlook Medical Center and Morristown Medical Center libraries in a pilot program to provide resources to help improve health and health literacy in the community. These resources are packed into Health Literacy Tote Bags, which library patrons can check out at the Westfield Memorial Library.

The tote bags contain information on 15 specific health topics such as Alzheimer's Disease, Arthritis, Bereavement/Grief, Heart Health, Mental Health, Prediabetes, Diabetes, Opioid and Substance Abuse and Stroke Recovery. Every bag includes books, and many have CDs, DVDs and links to online resources. All have complimentary handouts on each topic that patrons may keep. The bags can be checked out for four weeks and are available on a first-come, first-served basis.

Other participating LUCC libraries are Clark, Cranford, Kenilworth, Mountainside, Plainfield, Roselle, Roselle Park, Scotch Plains, Springfield, Summit and Union. This program is supported in part with funding from the Chubb Foundation and Novartis.
