PORTER RUNS FOR 2 TD, PASSES FOR 1; OSLISLO 1 TD

Immaculata Spartans Storm Past Raiders in Football, 40-30

Sophomore running back Jordan Kinsler rushed for 274 yards and scored five touchdowns as the Immaculata Spartans shredded the Scotch Plains-Fanwood defense on their way to a 40-30 victory on September 22 in Scotch Plains. The win improved the Spartan record to 3-0, while the 0-3 Raiders continue to look for their first victory of the season. As has been the case with many Raider games over the past three seasons, this one was an offensive shootout.

In the first quarter, the Raiders scored on the opening possession of the game. After Chris Sekiya returned the opening kickoff to the Spartan 26-yard line, it took the Raiders just four plays to find the end zone. On a first-and-goal from the 3-yard line, senior running back Alex Oslislo stormed up the middle for a touchdown to make the score 7-0.

14-7 lead with 7:40 left before the half.

The Raiders answered with a six-play, 68-yard drive that was capped by Porter's six-yard touchdown run on a QB keeper around the right side. After a successful extra point, the game was knotted 14-14 with 5:34 remaining before the half.

The tie lasted just two plays though as Kinsler gashed the Raider defense for a 70-yard touchdown run to make it 21-14 with 5:34 left in the second quarter. On a second-and-six from the 30-yard line, Kinsler took a handoff into the middle of the line before cutting to the left and outracing a Raider defense that over pursued to the middle of the field.

It appeared the Raiders would answer yet again as the offense drove from their 35-yard line deep into Spartan territory. But facing a second-and-goal from the five, disaster struck when Porter's option pitch right to Shawn Martin was behind him allow-

sure of satisfaction on the next series when Oslislo managed to tackle Spartan QB Patrick Frauenheim in the end zone for a safety, cutting the lead to 28-16. The play helped the Raiders draw closer as their next drive after the free kick resulted in a touchdown. The Raiders drove 46 yards in 12 plays, capped by a nice seven-yard play action touchdown pass from Porter to Jake Hahn in the end zone. After an unsuccessful two-point conversion, the Raiders had pulled to within 28-22 with 2:05 remaining in the third quarter.

"It was fourth-and-goal, we couldn't get it in on third down," said Porter. "We ran a slip play action. I saw Hahn open and I threw it and luckily it got there for the touchdown."

The Spartans answered by driving 60 yards for a score. Ryan Enright swept in around right end for an 11-yard touchdown run with 10:50 left in the game to make it 34-22.

The Raiders were forced to punt on their next series and Immaculata marched in for another score, this time coming from Kinsler on a 20-yard cutback run up the middle that gave the Spartans a commanding 40-22 lead with 6:34 remaining.

"It is just the little things," said Oslislo. "When we are doing things right, it works. But when we mess up little things, little tiny mistakes can be the difference between a touchdown and two yards, honestly."

The Raiders scored again when Porter capped a 67-yard march with a one-yard touchdown run to pull the Raiders closer. A successful 2-point conversion made it at 40-30 game with 3:20 remaining. But the Raiders failed to recover an onside kick attempt, sealing the game for Immaculata.

Almost lost in Kinsler's spectacular 274 yard, five-TD performance was the powerful running game put together by Scotch Plains-Fanwood. Porter (24-183-2 TD) and Oslislo (25-151 TD) led a running game that racked up 349 total yards.

The Raiders will host Summit this Saturday, September 29 at 1 p.m.

The Raiders' offense was never in question. But the defense, which has given up 100 points through two games this season, also appeared ready to join the party. The defense held Immaculata scoreless through the opening quarter and forced a Spartan punt on their first series only to have a roughing the punter penalty give Immaculata new life. But the Raider "D" came through again, forcing a fumble that Matt Fazzino recovered at the SPF 35-yard line.

"Our coaches prepared us for the offense," said Oslislo. "We knew what they were doing. We knew what we had to do in order to stop it. It wasn't too complex of an offense. In the first quarter everyone was doing their job."

The Raiders had a chance to extend the lead as they drove deep into Spartan territory after the turnover. But the drive stalled at the Immaculata 12-yard line. The Spartans began to move the ball on their next series and even though they did not score in the opening quarter, they were on their way to pay dirt. Immaculata moved the ball to midfield as the second quarter opened and on the first play from scrimmage, Kinsler took a handoff into the middle of the Raider defense, then bounced it outside and streaked 50 yards for his first touchdown of the game to tie the score at 7-7.

"Fifteen (Kinsler) is a very talented player," said Raider QB/LB Anthony Porter. "Obviously, he was very quick. But really it was more just mental errors on our part. We weren't in the right place. We weren't in the right spots to take him down."

Immaculata's go ahead touchdown was set up by a short field. The Spartans gained possession on the Raider 36 after stopping them on a fourth-and-10. Four plays later, facing a fourth-and-two situation, Kinsler burst through the middle of the line, stumbled then regained his balance and streaked 28 yards for a touchdown. The score gave Immaculata a

ing an Immaculata defender to recover it at the 18-yard line. Instead of a potential tie heading into the break, the Raiders were down 21-14.

Kinsler showed no signs of slowing down in the second half. On the Spartan's first play from scrimmage, the sophomore torched the Raider defense again, this time on a misdirection play before sweeping around the left end for a 52-yard touchdown. Kinsler's speed was bad enough but the nifty ball handling and deception involved in the Spartan offense seemed to be too much for the Raider defenders.

"We run a three-three defense where everyone is responsible for their own gaps, so even with the misdirection if we have our guys in the right gaps, we should be able to plug it up," said Oslislo.

Murray's 2nd OT Goal Propels Cougar Girls Past Summit, 1-0

Maggie Murray connected for the game-winning goal early into the second overtime period to give the Cranford High School Cougars a thrilling 1-0 victory over the Summit girls soccer team on September 20 at Memorial Field in Cranford. The game-ending strike came suddenly after the two teams battled to a scoreless stalemate through 90 minutes of action. Then a little over a minute into the second OT period, Murray took advantage of a perfect opportunity.

"We have a player in the back, Claire Ganley, she has a rocket throw," said Murray. "She throws it for us every single time. She just got it in and I was around the corner with my back to the goal. I just arched my back, jumped up and tipped it in with

Coach Andrew Gagliardo. "I think it took us a little more time than we wanted to adjust to that and get our hunger to match theirs. As the game went on I think we began to increase it little by little and then in the OT it increased even more. We were telling the girls that we had more opportunities in the OTs than we did in the entire eighty minutes that came before it."

Time and again, Summit managed to turn away scoring opportunities by the Cranford attack. The game had the look of one that could slip away from the Cougars at any moment.

"I saw the opportunities," said Gagliardo. "We had our girl Kenzie Butler over here, she had to be about three yards out, nobody on her, she takes her touch and she gives it just enough time for the defender to get a

goalkeeper Amanda Vath. But before Kim could get the shot off, Ahern tracked her down from behind and swiped the ball away preserving the 0-0 tie.

"Abby Ahern has been our most consistent player all season long. She was an honorable mention, All-County player last year. She plays every minute of every game for us. She is just solid, work hard, physical central back that you need. In that moment when the ball went through, we were all biting our nails and then you see Abby turn the gas on and get just enough to make the shot a little more difficult for her. I'd say it saved me from a heart attack, maybe not that extreme, but it is to the point where you just are thankful for how hard she plays for us," Coach Gagliardo said.

my head."

Cranford earned its fifth straight win after a season-opening loss to Watchung Hills but they had to work very hard for this one against an inspired Hilltopper squad. Summit matched the Cougars throughout the first half and kept the Cranford offense from getting into a rhythm.

"I think we were getting frustrated," said Murray. "The game is usually a lot easier for us and we get a lot of balls in and we get a lot of crosses in but we weren't today. When we brought it in right before the overtime, our coach talked to us and I think we just went into the OT with a fire lit under us."

There was no doubt that Cranford was the aggressor in the second half, particularly as regulation wound down. The Cougars pressed the Summit defense time after time over the final 10 minutes but simply could not finish with a goal.

"I think Summit brought a physicality, an aggressiveness and a hunger that I don't think we were really ready for, to be honest," said Cranford Head

coach Andrew Gagliardo. "I think it took us a little more time than we wanted to adjust to that and get our hunger to match theirs.
