NOTICE OF PENDING BOND ORDINANCE AND SUMMARY

The bond ordinance, the summary terms of which are included herein, was introduced and passed upon first reading at a meeting of the Town Council of the Town of Westfield, in the County of Union, State of New Jersey, on May 7, 2019. It will be further considered for final passage, after public hearing thereon, at a meeting of the Town Council to be held in the Municipal Building, 425 East Broad Street, Westfield, New Jersey, on May 21, 2019 at 8:00 P.M. During the week prior to and up to and including the date of such meeting copies of the full ordinance will be available, at no cost and during regular business hours, at the Clerk's office for the members of the general public who shall request the same. The summary of the terms of such bond ordinance follows:

TITLE: BOND ORDINANCE TO AUTHORIZE THE MAKING OF VARIOUS PUBLIC IMPROVEMENTS AND THE ACQUISITION OF NEW AUTOMOTIVE VEHICLES, INCLUDING ORIGINAL APPARATUS AND EQUIPMENT, IN, BY AND FOR THE TOWNSHIP OF CRANFORD, IN THE COUNTY OF UNION, STATE OF NEW JERSEY, TO APPROPRIATE THE SUM OF \$4,760,000 TO PAY THE COST THEREOF, TO MAKE A DOWN PAYMENT, TO APPROPRIATE CAPITAL SURPLUS, TO AUTHORIZE THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS TO FINANCE SUCH APPROPRIATION AND TO PROVIDE FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BOND ANTICIPATION NOTES IN ANTICIPATION OF THE ISSUANCE OF SUCH BONDS.

The purposes, appropriations and bonds/notes authorized in this multipurpose bond ordinance are as follows:

SCHEDULE OF IMPROVEMENTS, PURPOSES AND AMOUNTS

A. Undertaking of the following road and pedestrian safety improvements: (i) installation of flashing pedestrian beacons at various locations and (ii) resurfacing or reconstruction of various roads or sections thereof (including drainage improvements, where necessary, and installation of handicapped access ramps), as set forth on a list prepared by the Town Engineer on file or to be placed on file with the Town Clerk, and hereby approved as set forth herein in full. Depending upon the contract price and other exigent circumstances, and upon approval by the Town Council, there may be additions to or deletions from the list referred to in clause (ii) of the preceding sentence. It is hereby determined and stated that the roads being improved are of "Class B" or equivalent construction as defined in Section 22 of the Local Bond Law (Chapter 2 of Title 40A of the New Jersey Statutes Annotated, as amended; the "Local Bond Law").

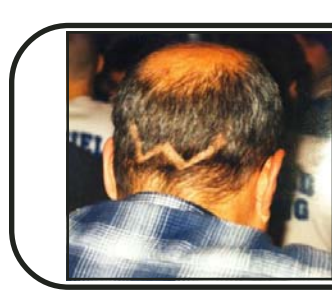

Devil's Den

The 1960s, the Decade WHS Took Off: 1969

Last in a 10-part series
Just when you thought things in the country couldn't become more chaotic, along came 1968, with an incredibly schizoid summer that trickled into the fall, when the Class of 1969 began its final year of high school.

Here are just a couple of the highlights, or lowlights, depending on your point of view:

The North Koreans captured the USS Pueblo, creating a tense situation in the Cold (but heating up fast) War. After 11 months they released the crew but kept the ship.

North Vietnam launched its Tet Offensive, catching the U.S. and South Vietnam by surprise. It was a wake-up call for the Americans, and by summer end's more than 300 Selective Service offices had been invaded by anti-war protesters and thousands of files destroyed.

Rowan and Martin's "Laugh-In" debuted and established the gold standard of satiric, sketch comedy, at least until 1975, when Saturday Night Live started.

President Johnson's Kerner Commission on America's race riots says the country is "moving toward two societies, one black and one white, separate and unequal."

The Reverend Martin Luther King Jr. was assassinated in Memphis. Over the next week, riots in more than 100

cities leave 39 dead, 2,600 injured and 21,000 arrested.

Robert F. Kennedy, gaining momentum in the presidential race, wins the California primary, but was assassinated after giving a speech in Los Angeles.

American sprinters Tommie Smith and John Carlos raised their black-gloved fists on the medal stand after finishing first and third in the 200-meter dash at the Olympics in Mexico City. The silent protest - they also wore black socks and no shoes to the ceremony - against racial discrimination in the U.S. was condemned by the Olympic Committee.

Star Trek aired the episode "Plato's Stepchildren," which had television's first interracial kiss (not shown in parts of the South due to concerns about advertisers) between Capt. Kirk and Lt. Uhura.

Richard M. Nixon became the 37th president of the United States.

Apollo 8 became the first manned spacecraft to orbit the Moon. The three astronauts - Jim Lovell, Bill Anders and Frank Borman - received many congratulatory messages upon their return, including one that said, "You saved 1968."

Meanwhile, WHS's teams and athletes ended the wild and wacky decade with a record of 91 winning teams and just five teams with losing records.

Here's how 1968-69 went for the Blue Devils:

Cross-country: Led by captains Mike Murray and Dave Brown, Walt Clarkson's harriers went 16-2, winning the conference and sectional titles while finished second in the county (to Roselle Catholic) and state Group (Bloomfield) meets. Murray was gold medalist at the conference meet, and also breaking Dave Calvert's school record in the state finals.

Football: The Devils lost star full-back Drew Viglianti (quit team before opener), lost two of its first three games (to Clark and Berkeley Heights) and then lost coach Gary Kehler for a couple of weeks in midseason when he was sidelined by hepatitis. But assistants Dick Zimmer and Al Leonzi led the team over Rahway (29-0) and Nutley (34-0), and the final record was 7-2. The last six victories were the start of the program's historic 48-game unbeaten streak that lasted until the end of the 1973 season.

Soccer: Bob Adriance was the new coach and the team went 8-5-4, losing the first round of the county tournament and the second round of states. Jeff Griffiths earned all-county.

Basketball: With Tom Scott finishing up an outstanding three-year career (830 points, still No. 13 all-time), Bob Fulton's club went 15-7. Kevin Kane, Jim Kelly, Bruce Rider and Ted Mavraganis helped beat St. Patrick in counties before losing to Roselle Catholic by two.

Swimming: Captained by John Ackerson and Pete Klaiber, Chuck Gantner's second team went 10-3, winning a Triple Crown - counties, Easterns and states. Led by juniors Gordon Clark and Steve Schmitt, WHS won 10 of 11 events at counties and eight of 11 at states.

Indoor track: The Devils won their first state Group 4 title, and first indoor title since 1932, paced by state 880 champion Paul Byrne. WHS also had the state champion mile relay team of John Lerner, Mike Murray, Dave Brown and Byrne.

Wrestling: With Gary Kehler hospitalized with hepatitis, Al Leonzi filled in and the team went 9-3, capturing the District 12 championship. Winning district titles were Tony Glennon, Bill Kenny, Rick and Pete Adelaar, Bill Dunham and Frank Jackson.

Baseball: Dick Zimmer's second year at the helm finished a disappointing 10-11-1, lost its county opener and failed to qualify for the state tournament. (Junior p-ss Tony Fittapaldi was reportedly caught riding his brother's motorcycle through the halls.) Pat McCabe was a bright spot, hitting .351 and earning all-county.

Golf: Gary Kehler's squad went 11-1-2, won the conference, took third at counties and fourth at sectionals. Captain Mike Falcone, Bob Palmer, Bobby Lay and Paul Mass were normally the top four.

Tennis: Bill Hansel's netmen went 17-4 and reached the third round of states. Captain Pete Galligan handled

first doubles with John McManigal, with Joe Krakora, Steve Mease and Scott Chancer handling singles.

Track: Walt Clarkson's club had an off year, finishing 9-3 and not winning any of the major team titles. Tom Fennell set a school record 49.3 in winning the county 440; Carlton Jackson (long jump) and Jeff Greisemer (javelin) were conference champs. Paul Byrne broke his school record in the 880 with a 1:53.6, finishing second in the state.

Record: 112 wins, 41 losses, 7 ties; 2 conference, 1 county, 2 sectional/district, 2 state titles.

During the summer of 1969 an event took place in New York state that shook the world. The Woodstock Festival - "An Aquarian Exposition: 3 Days of Peace and Music" - took place Aug. 16-19 on a 600-acre dairy farm in Bethel. It was four days of (in no particular order) rock and roll, drugs, mud and sex; the crowd was estimated at a half-million people. Richie Havens kicked off the performances on Friday, and Jimi Hendrix brought the curtain down on Monday.

As one writer of the time put it, "The history of Woodstock is the history of the turbulent '60s in microcosm."

If the '60s didn't end at Woodstock, the decade unofficially ended the next month, when John Lennon informed his bandmates that he was leaving the Beatles.

But WHS's athletes had only just begun. The previous 10 years saw them win at a 78.3 clip for all team events combined. That included 15 state team titles and 73 state individual winners. Now, 50 years later, the Blue Devils are the state's winningest Group 4 school and remain among the state's elite programs.

IN PASSING
David Coleman ('62), one of the great runners in WHS history, passed on April 27 at age 75. Coleman was a state champion in cross-country and also won the indoor 1,000. He also was a two-time Union County and Central Jersey Group 4 winner in the 880, a conference champ in the 440, and graduated with five individual school records (600, 880, 1,000, mile, 2.5 miles) and numerous relay marks.

Gino Marchetti, an all-time great defensive end for the Baltimore Colts, passed on April 29 at age 92. He lent his money and first name to the Gino's hamburger chain, which was popular in Clark (now it's a Wendy's). The Gino's Giant - a "banquet in a bun" - was a prototype of the McDonald's Big Mac.

ON THIS DATE
1977: The WHS golfers captured the District 4 title at Rutgers Golf Course. Captain Jeff Campbell led with a 76, followed by Tom Ansbro and John Sidorakis with 84s, and Bill Sutman at 86.
