#### Mary Fitzsimmons, 79, Devoted to Her Family, Students, Church and Pets


Mary Fitzsimmons, 79, passed away peacefully at her home in Westfield, N.J., on Friday, May 24,

#### Charles R. Morrison, Sr., Family Man, Civic Leader, Longtime Westfield Resident

Charles R. Morrison, Sr.

Mr. Charles Randolph Morrison, Sr., 98, quietly passed away on Tuesday, May 7, 2019, at his Florida home, surrounded by family.

Mr. Morrison was born on October 26, 1920 in North Carolina, and was raised in Flint, Michigan.

A member of "The Greatest Generation,' Mr. Morrison grew up on a small farm in Michigan during the Great Depression. During World War II he enlisted in the United States Army, where he ultimately rose to Chief Warrant Officer, becoming one of the few Black officers in a segregated United States Armed Forces.

In 1963, he marched with Dr. Martin Luther

King, Jr. during "The March on Washington for Jobs and Freedom." Professionally, Mr. Morrison's career in New Jersey included influential positions at Esso and, later, at Union Carbide. At Union Carbide, he served as a laboratory technician conducting research before making a career change to Human Resources. As an Employee Resources Lead during a time when the term "diversity and inclusion" didn't exist his exemplary actions helped open doors for other Blacks towards em-

ployment. Mr. Morrison attended North Carolina Central University. He married Shirley Bryant, his wife of nearly 70 years, in 1949. Anyone who has spent time around the two of them knows that they were truly life partners. Together, they had five children, all of whom are impres-

sive in their unique ways, having had achievements in business, education and medicine.

In Westfield, Mr. Morrison and his young family joined the congregation of Saint Luke's AME Zion Church, where he served as the chair

of the Trustee Board and superintendent of Sunday School. He also served on the Westfield Local Assistance Board.

Mr. Morrison was remarkable for his civicmindedness and leadership. When the Town of Westfield, in the late sixties, wanted to turn the large field behind North Scotch Plains Avenue into a municipal equipment storage and dump vard, Mr. Morrison mo-

bilized the local community. Once rallied, the civic group ultimately persuaded the town governance to instead transform the field into what is today The Westfield Memorial Pool Complex.

Additionally, Mr. Morrison led diversified marches for civil rights in Westfield, for some of which he partnered with Westfield's Temple Emanu-El members. Further, Mr. Morrison was a leader of concerned citizens that resulted in the Westfield Board of Education being among the first communities in Union County to close schools in observance of Martin Luther King Day.

During this earlier, civic action period, the mayor of Westfield sent Mr. Morrison a telegram asking for him to cease his disruptive activity in Westfield. Decades later, as Mr. Morrison and his wife were preparing to move to Florida, the new mayor sent Mr. Morrison a telegram thanking him for his historical and pivotal work in the Westfield community.

Mr. Morrison is survived by his wife, Shirley; their children, Charles Jr., Jacquelynne (Thaddeus), James, Gregory (Karen) and Adrienne; as well as by seven grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.
