Devil's Den

Joe Wilson Joins Long List of WHS Authors

Westfield Athletic Hall of Fame 2018 inductee Joe Wilson (Class of 1972) has just published an electronic book (e-book) *The Code of Many Colors: Nature's Number-Color Equation*, which he calls "eclectic, mystical and evangelical" although the pages certainly do not convey your typical evangelical approach but rather one which embraces believers of other faiths as well as agnostics and atheists as co-equals going to Heaven.

In a proscriber manner Wilson makes the case how "every whole number matches an individual color in the natural order of things." Commenting on the book, Wilson said, "Over the years I've read a few crackpot theories equating numbers and colors, but *this* is the genuine article."

The front cover shows the familiar Pythagorean 3-4-5 right triangle representing Mount Zion — the blue mountain of 7. Wilson also expounds "the grand equation of the universe" and "theological unified field," tying it all together in the Epilogue with number color haiku.

"It's definitely a book of a different color," Wilson said. "When I began writing it, I had no idea Plato would turn out to be the hero."

Some of the more timely, relevant topics include racism (and another code of many colors) and the ongoing debate over creation and evolution where Wilson delineates the early

chronology in Genesis to reconcile the two as not mutually exclusive.

The Code of Many Colors can be ordered on Amazon and downloaded with a Kindle app. It's an easy read, with a healthy dose of math, well epigraphed, and the product of a lifelong local resident educated in the Westfield Public Schools.

"Anyone can publish an e-book for free," Wilson said. "I did the whole thing myself as a neophyte. The only thing I needed help with was that pesky triangle on the front cover."

Content includes philosophy, theology, astronomy, cosmology, mathematics, arithmetic, number theory, geometry, algebra, physics, music, art, symbolism, mysticism, history, ontology, epistemology, hermeneutics and Platonic realism.

Since Wilson's book just became available, and I'm currently in the middle of reading another outstanding Dominic Smith novel, this is not a book review. But knowing Joe for almost 50 years, I've no doubt that the book is, a) thought provoking, b) grammatically correct, and c) not politically correct.

Wilson, a four-time state champion swimmer at WHS and an NCAA qualifier at the University of Alabama, joins a fairly long list of Westfield natives and WHS graduates who have penned books. Whether it's a fact-based history, a novel or a time piece, this list includes (off the top of my head): Dennis Powers, Henry Sturcke, Joe Valerio, Joe Sullivan, Joe Monninger, Steve Merrill, Bruce Moran, Bill Kane and Sally Williams Cook, among many, many others.

Powers ('60), WHS's first state wrestling champion in 1960, has written numerous books, including *Treasure Ship: The Legend and Legacy of the S.S. Brother Jonathan*.

Sturcke ('66) dabbled in soccer and track at WHS, attended Woodstock and several years ago wrote *Foiled into Thinking: Dylan, the Sixties and the End of World*, among others.

Valerio ('67), whose brother John coached football in town, was a journalist, writing for the *New York Post* and winning multiple Emmys as a sports writer and producer. Three years ago he penned *Second to None: The Relentless Drive and the Impossible Dream of the Super Bowl Bills*, about the Buffalo teams, who lost four straight Super Bowls from 1991-94.

Monninger ('71), known as "Broad Street Joe" during his WHS football days, has written 14 novels, three non-fiction books and had short pieces in *Sports Illustrated* and *Playboy*, among others. He's written *Two-Ton: one fight, one night: Tony Galento vs. Joe Louis*,

plus some nostalgic novels like *Second Season*, *New Jersey and Game Change*, where he name-drops more than a few familiar faces. (Spoiler alert: Coach K is a tip of the cap to Monninger's coach, Gary Kehler.)

Sullivan ('70), Merrill ('71) and Moran ('76) were all contributors to my 2012 book *Covered Wooden Grandstands*. Sully wrote about a couple of old-timers — Walt Earl and John Turner — who were in their late 40s and still playing in the Morris County Major Baseball League. "Steamboat" had a story about the rise and fall of the Washington Bombers, a powerhouse team in the old Tri-County League. And "Space" profiled Ray Korn, the legendary Elizabeth High coach who was a great player for the Woodbridge Rec teams that dominated the Union County League with a 55-4 record in 1977.

Kane ('77), who played guard on WHS's "Spud and Boo" basketball teams of the mid-1970s, is the father of WHS athletes David ('14) and Mike ('19). He wrote *The Truth About Throwing in Change*, and is currently working on a book about how the coaching philosophies of UCLA basketball legend John Wooden would work in the modern-day business world.

And Cook ('71), who dated Monninger while they were in high school, has written many books for kids and young adults. She's interviewed Meryl Streep, President Jimmy and Rosalynn Carter, Little Richard and Merle Haggard, among others. And she co-authored, with former Alabama coach Gene Stallings, the New York Times bestseller *Another Season: A Coach's Story of Raising an Exceptional Son*.

Last fall the Blue Devils were 15-4, Union County co-champions (with Kent Place), and ranked No. 9 in the state. The only letter winners back are No. 1 singles Natalie Zelechowski and No. 3 Katey Peretz. But incoming freshman Sophia Montero gives coach Matt Varhley's club a solid singles lineup.

Especially missed will be Charlotte Clausen and Eliza Weiniger, who reached the state Doubles Tournament final, where they lost to Millburn in three hard-fought sets 4-6, 6-4, 7-6 (3). The Devils will compete next weekend at the always-loaded Moorestown Classic.

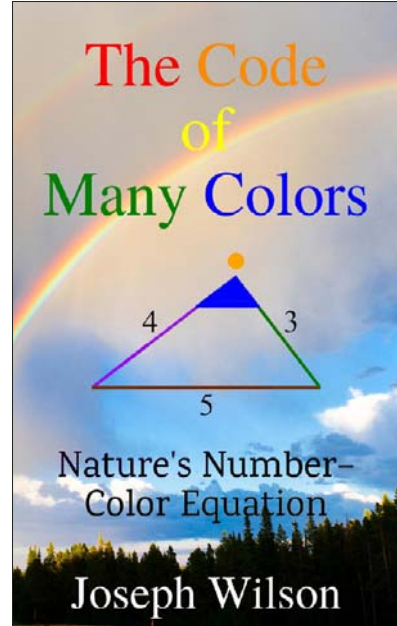
