**BOND ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING VARIOUS CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS IN AND FOR THE BOROUGH OF FANWOOD, IN THE COUNTY OF UNION, NEW JERSEY, APPROPRIATING \$988,749 THEREFORE AND AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$939,149 BONDS OR NOTES TO FINANCE PART OF THE COST THEREOF.**  
 BE IT ORDAINED, BY THE BOROUGH COUNCIL OF THE BOROUGH OF FANWOOD, IN THE COUNTY OF UNION, NEW JERSEY (not less than two-thirds of all members thereof affirmatively concurring) AS FOLLOWS:

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 BE IT ORDAINED, BY THE BOROUGH COUNCIL OF THE BOROUGH OF FANWOOD, IN THE COUNTY OF UNION, NEW JERSEY (not less than two-thirds of all members thereof affirmatively concurring) AS FOLLOWS:

**SECTION 1:**  
 The improvements described in Section 3 of this bond ordinance (the "Improvements") are hereby authorized to be undertaken by the Borough of Fanwood, New Jersey (the "Borough") as general improvements. For the said Improvements there is hereby appropriated the amount of \$988,749, such sum includes the sum of \$49,600 as the down payment (the "Down Payment") required by the Local Bond Law of the State of New Jersey, constituting Chapter 2 of Title 40A of the New Jersey Statutes, as amended and supplemented (the "Local Bond Law"). The Down Payment is now available by virtue of provision in one or more previously adopted budgets for down payments or capital improvement purposes.  
**SECTION 2:**  
 In order to finance the additional cost of the Improvements not covered by application of the Down Payment, negotiable bonds of the Borough are hereby authorized to be issued in the principal amount of \$939,149 pursuant to the provisions of the Local Bond Law (the "Bonds"). In anticipation of the issuance of the Bonds and to temporarily finance said improvements or purposes, negotiable bond anticipation notes of the Borough are hereby authorized to be issued in the principal amount not exceeding \$939,149 pursuant to the provisions of the Local Bond Law (the "Bond Anticipation Notes" or "Notes").  
**SECTION 3:**  
 (a) The Improvements authorized and the purposes for which obligations are to be issued, the estimated cost of each Improvement and the appropriation therefor, the estimated maximum amount of bonds or notes to be issued for each Improvement and the period of usefulness of each Improvement are as follows:

(b) The estimated maximum amount of Bonds or Notes to be issued for the purpose of financing a portion of the cost of the Improvements is \$939,149.  
 (c) The estimated cost of the Improvements is \$988,749 which amount represents the initial appropriation made by the Borough.

**SECTION 4:**  
 All Bond Anticipation Notes issued hereunder shall mature at such times as may be determined by the chief financial officer of the Borough (the "Chief Financial Officer"); provided that no Note shall mature later than one year from its date. The Notes shall bear interest at such rate or rates and be in such form as may be determined by the Chief Financial Officer. The Chief Financial Officer shall determine all matters in connection with Notes issued pursuant to this ordinance, and the signature of the Chief Financial Officer upon the Notes shall be conclusive evidence as to all such determinations. All Notes issued hereunder may be renewed from time to time subject to the provisions of Section 8(a) of the Local Bond Law. The Chief Financial Officer is hereby authorized to sell part or all of the Notes from time to time at public or private sale and to deliver them to the purchasers thereof upon receipt of payment of the purchase price plus accrued interest from their dates to the date of delivery thereof. The Chief Financial Officer is directed to report in writing to the Borough Council of the Borough at the meeting next succeeding the date when any sale or delivery of the Notes pursuant to this ordinance is made. Such report must include the amount, the description, the interest rate and the maturity schedule of the Notes sold, the price obtained and the name of the purchaser.

**SECTION 5:**  
 The capital budget of the Borough is hereby amended to conform with the provisions of this ordinance to the extent of any inconsistency herewith. The resolution in the form promulgated by the Local Finance Board showing full detail of the amended capital budget and capital program as approved by the Director, Division of Local Government Services, Department of Community Affairs, State of New Jersey is on file with the Borough Clerk and is available for public inspection.

**SECTION 6:**  
 The following additional matters are hereby determined, declared, recited and stated:  
 (a) The Improvements described in Section 3 of this bond ordinance are not current expenses, and are capital improvements or properties that the Borough may lawfully make or acquire as general improvements, and no part of the cost thereof has been or shall be specially assessed on property specially benefited thereby.  
 (b) The average period of usefulness of the Improvements, within the limitations of the Local Bond Law, taking into consideration the respective amounts of all obligations authorized for the several purposes, according to the reasonable life thereof computed from the date of the Bonds authorized by this bond ordinance, is 14.75 years.  
 (c) The Supplemental Debt Statement required by the Local Bond Law has been duly prepared and filed in the office of the Borough Clerk and a complete executed duplicate thereof has been filed in the office of the Director, Division of Local Government Services, Department of Community Affairs, State of New Jersey. Such statement shows that the gross debt of the Borough, as defined in the Local Bond Law, is increased by the authorization of the Bonds and Notes provided in this bond ordinance by \$939,149 and the obligations authorized herein will be within all debt limitations prescribed by the Local Bond Law.  
 (d) An aggregate amount not exceeding \$68,200 for items of expense listed in and permitted under Section 20 of the Local Bond Law is included in the estimated cost of the Improvements, as indicated herein.

**SECTION 7:**  
 Any funds received from time to time by the Borough as contributions in aid of financing the purposes described in Section 3 of this Ordinance shall be used for financing said Improvements by application thereof either to direct payment of the cost of said Improvements or to the payment or reduction of the obligations of the Borough authorized thereby by this Bond Ordinance. Any such funds received may, and all such funds so received which are not required for direct payment of the cost of said Improvements shall, be held and applied by the Borough as funds applicable only to the payment of obligations of the Borough authorized by this Bond Ordinance.  
**SECTION 8:**  
 The full faith and credit of the Borough are hereby pledged to the punctual payment of the principal of and interest on the obligations authorized by this bond ordinance. The obligations shall be direct, unlimited obligations of the Borough, and the Borough shall be obligated to levy ad valorem taxes upon all the taxable property within the Borough for the payment of the obligations and the interest thereon without limitation of rate or amount.  
**SECTION 9:**  
 This Bond Ordinance constitutes a declaration of official intent under Treasury Regulation Section 1.150-2. The Borough reasonably expects to pay expenditures with respect to the Improvements prior to the date that Borough incurs debt obligations under this Bond Ordinance. The Borough reasonably expects to reimburse such expenditures with the proceeds of debt to be incurred by the Borough under this Bond Ordinance. The maximum principal amount of debt expected to be issued for payment of the costs of the Improvements is \$939,149.  
**SECTION 10:**  
 This bond ordinance shall take effect 20 days after the first publication thereof after final adoption, as provided by the Local Bond Law.

**Blow: Won't Leave You Breathless**

 With *Blow*, director Ted Demme's entertaining but dramatically limited biography of pioneer drug dealer George Jung, there is initial promise of a far more exotic exercise. There is brief hope of revolutionary epiphanies and historical truths heretofore unuttered.

For a while, it even looks like David McKenna's adaptation of Bruce Porter's book might say something novel about the 1960s and its legacy. But it's the mood-capturing film's artistic re-creation of the times that's impressive, not the level of insight.

And despite yet another fine performance by Johnny Depp as the Massachusettsian who forged the Colombian cocaine connection, this rise and fall of a drug dealer saga is the same old story, only dressed in bellbottoms.

It's a rather traditional and distinctively American morality tale. A young man of modest means, swept up in the historical current, goes against what he instinctively knows is right in order to achieve success on his era's terms. And consciously or not, he blames his environment for the knee-jerk reaction that has reshaped him into a pleasure-seeking Philistine.

Hence in the case of George Jung, it's his hard-working plumber dad (Ray Liotta) and a perennially dissatisfied shrew of a mother (Franka Potente) who convince him not so much that he must be rich, but more importantly, that he must never be poor. When he discovers that selling drugs might buy him the security he craves, George becomes a psychedelic update of Theodore Dreiser's classic novel "An American Tragedy."

Naturally, like the ill-fated cycle of a drunk or a dope addict, the early portions of Jung's odyssey are full of fun and discovery. Traveling in 1968 from New England to California with his oafish sidekick Tuna (Ethan Suplee), no sooner has George made the scene than he's dealing marijuana and being fussed over by practically every young woman on the beach.

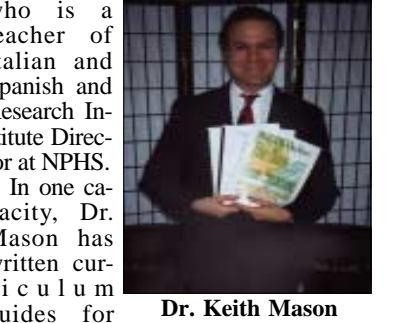
He has a knack for selling drugs, or so he thinks. But while he does possess a gift of gab, a forceful personality and a facility for strategy, for the most part George mistakeschutzpah for ability.

He doesn't think he'll get caught; he's wrong. He does not pass go. He goes directly to jail. Thus, while taking time off from the tumultuous 60's courtesy of the

## SPFHS Graduate Dr. Keith Mason Gets Creative

**SCOTCH PLAINS** - Dr. Keith Mason, a 1980 graduate of Scotch Plains-Fanwood High School, has provided behind-the-scenes help with the spring musicals at New Providence High School (NPHS) for the past three years.

*The Boys from Syracuse* was staged at NPHS on Friday and Saturday, March 9 and 10, benefited from the assistance of Dr. Mason,



who is a teacher of Italian and Spanish and Research Institute Director at NPHS.

In one capacity, Dr. Mason has written curriculum guides for *Carousel*, *Bye Bye Birdie*, and *The Boys from Syracuse*, outlining lesson ideas for over a dozen secondary subjects. This year, he developed another guide written especially for students in the production encouraging the use of musical theatre as a teaching tool and providing specific information about Rodgers and Hart's classic show *The Boys from Syracuse*.

Dr. Mason's world language students undertook projects in their Italian and Spanish classes. Projects included commemorative stamps and plates with text in Italian I, trading cards with biographies of principal cast members in Italian II, a show poster in Italian III, a color show program with digital photographs in Italian IV, and a stained glass window quilt in Spanish V.

In another capacity, Dr. Mason has directed the design of lobby displays for three musicals: "Carnival Scene" for *Carousel*, "Touring Downtown Sweet Apple" for *Bye Bye Birdie*, and this year's "Mediterranean Medley" for *The Boys from Syracuse*.

Combining extensive research, curriculum and the arts, Dr. Mason engaged all students in educational experiences through themes and settings of classic musical theatre works.

This year, 12 high school students and NPHS visual arts teacher Lynn Celler, helped Dr. Mason concert the high school's front lobby into a Mediterranean haven. The display included a silhouette exhibition of the "boys of Syracuse" holding a show poster, Florentine-style ivory arches with terracotta roofing, a creative genius villa with portraits of the musical's original creators, plant life from the Mediterranean, a fountain, stained glass spelling out the play's title, and two tree paintings with paper oranges featuring photos and names of cast members.

Dr. Mason has been recognized twice for his musical work within the Paper Mill Playhouse Rising Star program. He has received awards for Outstanding Educational Impact in 1999 and 2000 for his curriculum guides and projects for *Carousel* and *Bye Bye Birdie*.

Dr. Mason has taught at NPHS since 1996. He received a Bachelor of Arts Degree from Rutgers, and a Master of Arts Degree and Doctoral Degree from the University of Michigan. He is certified in Spanish, Italian, and English as a Second Language. He was recently issued his Supervisor certification.
