Summit's Ryan Hefter in the semis. Maloney then beat Felix Mil of Dayton, 7-5, 6-0, for third place. "He had an excellent match with Hefter. He has made leaps and bounds this year over last year," said Kapner of Maloney. At second singles, Blue Devil Ryan Jones beat J. T. Wilkinson of Union Catholic, 6-0, 6-0, then was stopped by Mike Klimchak of Dayton in the semis. In the consolations, Jones defeated Raider senior John Corbin, 6-1, 6-1. Corbin advanced to the second singles semifinals by defeating Dayton's Jared Weisman, 6-2, 5-7, 6-0. Although playing probably his best match of his career, Corbin was stopped by top-seeded Steen Sehnert of Summit. During Corbin's match with Sehnert, Raider Head Coach Dave Blackman commented, "John is playing one of his finest games but the kid from Summit is just too strong." "I thought it really was the best match I played all season. I was hitting my shots and hitting my backhand. My serve was a little weak, but he was returning everything," Corbin pointed out. Corbin, who had finished his semi match before Jones, speculated, "I have never played Jones. I have never played Klimchak before, but I understand he

is good. I'm just going to go in there with an open mind and try to win." At first doubles, Blue Devils Shaun Simone and Ryan Miller breezed past Brian Costello and Brian Banks of Union then, after falling in the semis, seized third by stopping Raiders Dave Jacober and Josh Sanders, 7-5, 6-2. Jacober and Sanders stopped UC Vikings Ryan Price and Dan Majcen, 7-5, 6-1, in the quarterfinals. Raiders Mike Thompson and Joe Wilkinson grabbed third at second doubles by defeating Lawrence Bluestone and Sergey Khoroshevsky of Dayton, 3-6, 6-3, 6-3. Previously, they stopped Chintan Patel and Devin Felter of Dayton in the quarterfinals, then fell to Blue Devils Devin Power and Doug Shineman in the semis. Power and Shineman finished second. The big showdown came in the first singles finals when top-seeded Miles Moriarity of New Providence, who previously played for Summit, faced his former teammate Hefter. In the longest match of the finals, Hefter emerged victorious in three sets.

GROPPER FANS 11, SCATTERS 6 HITS, WALKS NONE G. L. Highlanders 'Unsettle' Pioneer Nine, 4-1, in UCT

Strong pitching by senior left-hander Andrew Gropper earned the seventh-seeded, 12-7, Governor Livingston High School baseball team an impressive, 4-1, victory over their cross-town rival, the 10th-seeded, 10-4, New Providence Pioneers in the first round of the Union County tournament in Berkeley Heights on May 5.

Despite administrative decisions

The Highlanders took a 1-0 lead in the bottom of the first when Tom Lallis singled, stole second and reached third safely on a throwing error, then scored on a sacrifice RBI by DH, Pete Caggiano.

In the top of the third, Pioneer John Scarpa tied the score with a solo blast over the left field fence. In the fourth, Gropper gave up a leadoff single to Ron Fiorelli, then whisked away three Pioneers on strikeouts. Then, in the bottom of the inning,

Jon Regenye beat out the throw to first, came around to score via an error on a hit-and-run play triggered by Steve Lesnowich.

The Highlanders upped their lead to 3-1 in the bottom of the fifth on a walk by Frank Cavallo, a single by Caggiano and an RBI single by Dan Drake. Another insurance run was added in the sixth when catcher Lesnowich stroked a fastball for a triple, then scored on a costly Pioneer error.

Gropper struck out three Pioneers in the seventh to seal the victory.

Describing his outstanding pitching performance, Gropper said, "Actually, I didn't throw a change-up throughout the whole game. I simply relied on the fastball and curve. The main key during the game was that I didn't get behind anybody. I got three balls on one batter, that was in the first inning, but other than that I stayed ahead. I got a lot of defensive support, particularly that double play in the sixth, that was huge."

A satisfied coach Howard said, "Gropper pitched well. He keeps guys off base and doesn't walk anybody, so that's always so important. A couple of key hits, good defense and pitching will do it."

This Saturday, the Highlanders will host 15th-seeded Rahway who earned a 5-1 upset victory over second-seeded Elizabethtown in the quarterfinals.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Town of Westfield in the County of Union as follows:
SECTION I. That the improvements including, but not limited to, the improvement of senior citizens facilities including related professional services, and the acquisition of a seniors transportation equipment.
SECTION II. It is hereby determined and declared that the estimated amount of money to be raised from all sources to said purpose is \$225,000.00 and that the estimated amount of bonds or notes necessary to be issued for said purpose is \$210,000.00. There is hereby appropriated for said purpose the sum of \$15,000 from Capital Improvement Funds available for said purpose.
SECTION III. To finance such improvements there shall be issued pursuant to Local Bond Law and R.S. 40A:2-8 of the State of New Jersey, in anticipation of the issuance of bonds, Bond Anticipation Notes of said Town which shall not exceed in the aggregate principal amount the sum of \$210,000.00. There is hereby appropriated for said purpose the sum of \$5,000.00 from Capital Improvement Funds available for said purpose.
SECTION IV. SECTION VI. It is hereby determined that all monies received from grants shall be utilized to retire outstanding Bond Anticipation Notes issued for this purpose.
SECTION VII. It is hereby determined and declared that the period of usefulness for the financing of which said notes are to be issued is a period of five (5) years from the date of said bonds.
SECTION VIII.
