# Raiders Score 2 in 7th, Edge Farmer Diamond Men, 4-3

Raider Head Coach Brian Homm has got to be pleased with the performances of his two sophomore pitchers, Dave Senatore and Steve Pietrucha, and the never-give-up attitude of his players. Hosting the 8-4 Union Farmers on May 2, the Scotch Plains-Fanwood High School baseball team got a two-run double in the bottom of the seventh inning from Steve Williams to pull out a 4-3, come-from-behind victory.

With the exception of a glitch in the top of the third, Senatore held the Farmers, now 8-5, in check until the sixth when Pietrucha stepped up in relief and continued the shutdown. Previously, on April 19, Senatore held the Governor Livingston Highlanders to just one run until the seventh inning before being relieved.

"Dave pitched a great game. He got behind a little bit in the count early in the game. But then, he settled down and kept the ball low which was good," said Homm. "He kept them off balance, threw some change ups and his curve ball was working."

In addition to Williams, offensive heroics came from senior Anthony Blasi who blasted a two-run shot over the left field fence in the bottom of the third. Defensively, junior

catcher Brad Belford gunned down Farmer Justin Melia while attempting to steal third in the first inning and first baseman Marcus Dockery, who also had a double, made two

a confusing bunt which resulted in a bases-loaded situation. Steve Andriola chopped a two-run single past short. Then later, with runners on first and third, Senatore tossed to

The Farmers scored all of their

first and got the base runner in a rundown. In the meantime, the runner on third scooted home for the third run.

"That was a planned play," said Raider Assistant Coach Willie Leonard. "We work on it in practice, but we didn't execute properly."

"Actually, we had a pickoff play on them, but we didn't execute it properly," added Homm. "But we were fortunate to get that homer from Blasi which put us back into the game."

Blasi's blast in the bottom of the third also brought home Kyle Adams, who had walked. Then in the seventh, pinch hitter Andrew Pavoni stepped to the plate and bashed a double. Fearing Blasi, the Farmers intentionally walked him. A passed ball advanced both Pavoni and Blasi, then Williams ended the game with his two-out double to center.

"It didn't good look towards the end," commented Homm. "But we came through in the clutch. It's not easy to do with two outs, but the kids never gave up. It was a great win!"

### SPECIAL ORDINANCE NO. AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR IMPROVEMENTS TO PUBLIC BUILDINGS AND FACILITIES AND THE APPROPRIATION OF THE MONIES NECESSARY THEREFOR AND THE ISSUANCE OF BOND ANTICIPATION NOTES FOR THE FINANCING OF SAID WORK

BE IT ORDAINED by the Town of Westfield in the County of Union as follows:  
SECTION I. That the improvements including, but not limited to, the following be made to public buildings and facilities:

- (a) Public Works Center Improvements
- (b) Solar Powered School Flashing Signals
- (c) Municipal Building Improvements and Office Equipment
- (d) Additional Parking - Town Lot 3
- (e) Professional Engineering or Architectural services necessary for above items

SECTION II. That all said work shall be undertaken as a general improvement to be paid for by general taxation.

SECTION III. It is hereby determined and declared that the estimated amount of money to be raised from all sources to said purpose is \$170,000.00 and that the estimated amount of bonds or notes necessary to be issued for said purpose is \$155,000.00. There is hereby appropriated for said purpose the sum of \$15,000 from Capital Improvement Funds available for said purpose.

SECTION IV. To finance the improvements there shall be issued pursuant to Local Bond Law and R.S. 40A:2-8 of the State of New Jersey, in anticipation of the issuance of bonds, Bond Anticipation Notes of said Town which shall not exceed in the aggregate principal amount the sum of \$155,000.00. Said notes shall bear interest at a rate as hereafter may be determined within the limitations prescribed by law, and may be renewed from time to time pursuant to, and within the limitations prescribed by said law. All matters with respect to said notes not determined by this ordinance shall be determined by resolution to be hereafter adopted.

SECTION V. Not more than \$1,000.00 of the sum to be raised by the issuance of said notes may be used to finance interest on obligation issued to finance such purpose, whether temporary or permanent, legal expenses or to finance the cost of the issuance of such obligations as provided in R.S. 40A:2-20.

SECTION VI. It is hereby determined and declared that the period of usefulness for the financing of which said notes are to be issued is a period of ten (10) years from the date of said bonds.

SECTION VII. It is hereby determined and declared that the Supplemental Debt Statement required by said law has been duly made and filed in the office of the Town Clerk of said Town and that such Statement so filed shows that the gross debt of the Town as defined in R.S. 40A:2-43 of the State of New Jersey is increased by \$155,000.00 and that said notes authorized by this ordinance shall be within all debt limitations prescribed by said law.

SECTION VIII. This ordinance shall take effect twenty (20) days after first publication thereof after final passage.
