Day Care Can Help Those Coping With Alzheimer's

BERKELEY HEIGHTS - SAGE Spend-A-Day, headquartered in Berkeley Heights, has announced that November is National Alzheimer's Disease Month, "a time to recognize the devastation this disease can cause in people's lives."

When loved ones are diagnosed with the disease, the uncertainty of the future can be overwhelming for their caregivers, according to SAGE. Among the questions they face are: How quickly will the disease progress? What will tomorrow bring? Can my loved one be left alone? How can I do it all? Where do I go for help?

SAGE recommends that family members begin by calling the Alzheimer's Association at (800) 272-3900. The association can locate resources in the individual's area, including medical specialists, legal services, financial services, support groups and other information.

"As the disease progresses, a caregiver will need to make many decisions for their loved one. One of the most important decisions to be made will involve living arrangements. Some families feel that placement in a residential facility, such as assisted living or skilled nursing home will be the best choice given their set of circumstances," stated Trish Isack, a Licensed Social Worker and Director of SAGE Spend-A-Day.

"Others choose to keep their loved one at home, at least in the beginning and middle stages of the disease. These caregivers will usually need some assistance or respite in their responsibilities," she added.

Among the options for keeping an older person with a chronic illness or disability at home is adult day care. Adult day centers help relieve stress for caregivers by giving them some time off and benefit those suffering from dementia by providing specialized stimulating mental and physical activities.

Adult day centers typically offer older adults a day of socialization, exercise, meals, trips and activities in a safe, protected environment while their caregiver goes to work, does errands or just takes a break.

There are two types of adult day care programs - social and medical. Medical adult day care programs, such as the Spend-A-Day Adult Day Health Center in Berkeley Heights, are licensed by the state and can monitor clients' health in addition to providing social and recreational programs.

Care includes personalized health care plans and evaluations by a registered nurse, medication administration, blood pressure screening, weight and dietary monitoring. The facilities can also provide physical, occupational or speech therapies.

Spend-A-Day has been providing adult day services since 1975 and became licensed as an adult health center in 1999.

The facility offers a trained professional staff that provides personalized care "in a state-of-the-art setting that feels homey rather than clinical," Ms. Isack explained. She revealed that Spend-A-Day has received the highest possible rating - deficiency-free - every year at inspection.

Two levels of programming allow Spend-A-Day to meet the differing needs and interests of clients, including those with or without dementia or Alzheimer's disease, those with physical limitations and those who attend purely for socialization, according to the Director.

Spend-A-Day is a program of SAGE, a private, not-for-profit organization that provides home-based solutions for older adults and their families in Union, Morris, Somerset and Essex Counties.
