The Governor Livingston High School wrestling team improved to 10-8 by trouncing the A. L. Johnson Crusaders, 50-17, in Clark on February 6, then by whacking the hosting Manville Mustangs, 52-18, on February 9. Additionally, the Highlanders qualified for the North Jersey, Section 2, Group 2 sectional tournament and Head Coach Rick Iacono celebrated his 200th victory by beating Manville.

Marc Vanderveer scored a fireman's takedown and a two-point tilt to grab an 8-7 come-from-behind victory over Mike Coler at 103 to get the Highlanders rolling against the Crusaders.

"I beat him in the counties wrestling from my feet, so he kind of knew my style," said Vanderveer. "He was able to control me while building a 7-3 advantage. I didn't think four points was that tough to overcome, so I just decided to forget about everything and went right at him."

Tim Vanderveer at 125 and Mike Fullowan at 130 received forfeits. Craig DiStefano at 135 pinned Mike Terrano in 1:19 while Eric Serrano showed Edgar Vela the lights in 1:19 to make the team score 27-12. Justin Coughlin earned a 4-1 decision over 145-lb. Ed Hamilton. Jon Regenye improved to 20-1 by stabilizing Paul Minch in :18.

Marcello Cavallero at 171 added a reversal and a two-point nearfall in the third period to grab a 9-3 decision over Chris Winter. "I just let it all go today," said Cavallero. The Westfield High School girls' basketball team experienced the brunt of a one-two punch on February 4 and 5. First, the hosting Blue Devils were felled by Old Bridge, 78-43, then, they traveled to Newark and were paralyzed by No. 3 Malcolm X. Shabazz, 76-22.

Seniors Jackie Cusimano and Dana Passananti scored 15 and 11 points, respectively, for the Blue Devils against the Old Bridge Knights while Lisa Venezia netted seven points and Nicole Infantino added four. Amanda Meatto, Jaime Capra and Cathy Rutler fired in 18, 17 and 15 points, respectively, for the Knights.

The 10-8 Knights galloped to a 41-20 halftime lead with Rutler putting

in seven points in the first quarter and Capra firing in 11 in the second quarter. Passananti hit two 3-pointers in the second quarter. Cusimano rolled in 10 of her points in the second half. Meatto scored 14 of her points in the second half.

The 19-1 Shabazz Lady Bulldogs were stingy to all of the Blue Devils and held Cusimano to just 10 points. Passananti scored six, Venezia had four and Jessica O'Neill added two points. Shahida Williams bucketed 20 points and Matee Avajon put in 13.

Cusimano scored six of Westfield's eight first-half points via two 3-pointers while Shabazz totaled 39, led by Williams with 14 points. Passananti sank two 3-pointers in the second half but the entire starting five of the Lady Bulldogs got into the scoring act.
