The Westfield Police and the Union County (UC) Sheriffs softball teams, ranked one, two in their division of the UC Police League, confronted each other at Memorial Field in Westfield on July 18. The smoke finally cleared in the top of the seventh inning when shortstop Ed Belford ended it all with a massive homerun blast to earn Westfield a 13-12 victory.
