SEEK 'OFFENSIVE IDENTITY', CORRECT MISTAKES

M. X. Shabazz Bulldogs Shut Down Raider Gridders, 20-0

"Offensive identity" is what Scotch Plains-Fanwood High School football Head Coach Steve Ciccotelli quoted during and after the game with the hosting Bulldogs of Malcolm X. Shabazz on September 20. The 2-0 Bulldogs capitalized on the 1-1 Raiders' lack of offensive punch and added three big plays - each resulting in touchdowns (TDs) - to win 20-0.

Aware of the breakthrough speed of senior back Amir Pinnix, the Raiders "Wild Dog" defense keyed on containing him, and did, holding him to just 45 yards. However, the Bulldogs got a 46-yard TD reception by Barry Pickney with 30 seconds left in the first half, a 60-yard TD run by Glen Simpson in the third quarter and a 38-yard TD interception by Tyree Davis, also in the third.

"Three big plays! We blew coverage in the first half that gave them the score. We were misaligned on that second long run," expressed Raider Head Coach Steve Ciccotelli. "These are all correctable things."

The Raider defensive line looked impressive, especially in the first half, and continued to show improvement. On the Bulldogs' first offensive series, Raider sophomore Marc Fabiano grounded Pinnix for a one-

yard loss and defensive back Josh Wexler followed by dumping quarterback Temir Hill for a two-yard loss. Fabiano added a seven-yard sack. Unfortunately, two defensive mental lapses accounted for Bulldog TDs.

"We are a young group. It's baptism by fire," Ciccotelli pointed out. "We're going to get better. This group plays hard, very hard. Our effort is there. Our guys hit. I thought we hustled on defense. The whole defense played hard. Pinnix didn't beat us. That was our goal to stop him. The other kid beat us."

Senior lineman Chris Feighner and Fabiano led the Raiders with five tackles each followed by Wexler, Travis Boff and Rowland Adeyemo with four each.

Offensively, things immediately did not go well. A case of the butterflies prevented Kyle Adams from making a big return on the opening kickoff. Junior quarterback Mike Walker mishandled a snap on the very first play and was thrown for a 15-yard loss to the 16-yard line by Pinnix. The Raiders also fumbled on their first series of the second half.

Penalties definitely came into play, although both teams had nearly the same total - Shabazz (5 penalties for 55 yards) SP-F (6 penalties for 52 yards). Early in the fourth quarter, the Raiders had their only real drive extinguished on a double penalty that resulted in a 32-yard setback.

Shabazz had a 6-0 lead at the half but Simpson's 60-yard dash down the right sideline with 10:14 left in the third quarter upped the score to 12-0. Hill found Moneace Lavoli in the endzone for the two-point conversion. With 6:09 remaining in the third, Davis read Walker's eyes and picked off his pass intended for Wexler at the 38 and scampered in for the score.

"Michael, his head was down," explained Ciccotelli. "But there is not a quarterback who played who has never thrown a pick. I remember Montana being picked off by Lawrence Taylor who ran it back for a touchdown in the playoffs. That's part of the game and he will overcome it as he grows."

Wexler got plenty of practice punting and had two impressive ones. In the second quarter, he slanted a well-placed punt that went out at the Bulldog 12 and, in the fourth quarter, he booted a colossal 64-yard punt that bounced into the endzone.

Adams rushed for 55 yards on 15 carries, Adeyemo carried seven times for 18 yards, Kyle Baker had four carries for seven yards and Walker had four carries for 10 yards. Walker completed four passes in 11 attempts for 36 yards and yielded two interceptions.

"Offensively, we are struggling a little bit. We were not consistent. We never got anything going. We've got to get that worked out. That's my job," said Ciccotelli. "We lost some great kids who gave us an offensive identity last year. We have growing pains. We have guys stepping in for the first time. We are going to get better."

After being on the short end of the score against three very tough teams, the Westfield High School field hockey girls needed a victory stuffed under their belt. And the Lady Blue Devils got it in a big way by overwhelming Columbia, 2-0, in Westfield on September 19.

The 2-0 score was not indicative of how dominating the Blue Devils really were. With the exception of three brief Cougar attacks, the Blue Devils had Cougar goalie Ashley Fregman fending off shot after shot all after-

"I thought they played well and I was happy to see that they came out with a win," said Blue Devil Head Coach Maggie McFadden. "We played pretty well against Voorhees and, although the score didn't indicate it, I thought we played well against Oak Knoll. They just were not able to sustain it for an entire 60 minutes against Oak Knoll."

Senior forward Kathryn Seib on an assist from senior forward Emily Kahn scored the first goal 14:51 into the first half.

"You are only allowed to take one step on a stroke," explained McFadden. "Emily took two. It was a nice stroke. She has really stepped up. She creates a lot of things. She attracts a lot of the defense's attention."

Although they totally dominated Columbia, McFadden did have some concerns, however. "I've seen a lot of improvement from these kids. They put the ball in the goal but they had 26 scoring opportunities, we should have scored more. They were not getting the stick down in the circle and they weren't picking up the rebounds enough. But, that's going to come with time. They are feeling out each other. They are learning to play with each other and see what each can do. They are going to get better with each game," she said.

"With Voorhees, East Brunswick and Oak Knoll, I think we played some of the best teams in the state," said McFadden. "It was a tough way to open the season. I give these kids credit. They could have taken on a losing attitude, but they are not like that. They come out here every day and they are looking to win."
