

Charles E. Stiefken, 88, Patent Holder; Active In Little League, Booster Club

Charles E. Stiefken, 88, of Brodheads, Pa. died on Monday, July 3, in the Brookmont Health Care Center in Effort, Pa.

Born in Boston, Mass., a son of the late Charles and Dora Schuessler Stiefken, he grew up in New York City and Kingston, N.Y. Mr. Stiefken earned an academic scholarship to Stuyvesant High School, where he was a standout baseball and soccer player. He also played on numerous club teams, including the Swiss American Soccer Club.

Mr. Stiefken graduated from the Colorado School of Mines in Golden, Colo. in 1941 with a degree of Engineer of Mines. While there, he earned a varsity letter in baseball, playing third base and shortstop for the "Miners." He was a member of Kappa Sigma fraternity.

Upon graduation he received a Naval commission but was reassigned by the government to work on the Manhattan Project in a civilian capacity. In 1946 Mr. Stiefken went to work for ASARCO (American Smelt-

ing and Refining Company), where eventually he became the Research Section Head in charge of research for the South Plainfield facility.

During his 33-year career, he was granted numerous United States patents for his work in the mining and processing of asbestos and was regarded as one of the world's leading authorities in the field of asbestos.

Mr. Stiefken served as chairman of the International Fiber Research and Testing Committee (1972-1974) and of the ASARCO Twenty-five Year Club (1977-1978). He retired in 1979.

A resident of Westfield for 37 years, Mr. Stiefken moved to Brodheads in 1991. While living in Westfield, he was very active in Little League Baseball programs and coached for over 15 years. He was a member of the Westfield High School Booster Club and was pivotal in bringing soccer into the school's athletic program.

Additionally, he was a member of the Mid Jersey Dog Training Club and later was highly involved with the Make Peace with Animals Greyhound Adoption Organization. He also was very active in the Zion United Lutheran Church in Brodheads, where he was a member.

He and his wife, Nancy J. Milyard Stiefken, would have observed their 64th wedding anniversary on July 21. Surviving, in addition to his wife, are three sons, Charles Raymond Stiefken of California, Richard Carl Stiefken of Alaska and Kurt Jon Stiefken of New Jersey; nine grandchildren and seven great grandchildren.

Funeral services were held on Saturday, July 8, from the Zion United Lutheran Church, with the Reverend Ann Melot officiating.

GENERAL ORDINANCE NO. 1873 AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE CODE OF THE TOWN OF WESTFIELD, CHAPTER 27

BE IT ORDAINED by the Town Council of the Town of Westfield in the County of Union as follows:

SECTION I. That Article III. Limousines, Section 27-16 (b) "Fee", shall be amended to read in its entirety as follows:

The fee for the issuance of such license shall be fifty (50) dollars for each limousine licensed. Each such vehicle used as a limousine shall be licensed separately.

SECTION II. If any section, subsection, clause or phrase of this Ordinance is, for any reason, held to be unconstitutional or invalid, such decision shall not affect the remaining portions of this Ordinance.

SECTION III. Any and all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict or inconsistent with any part of this ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent that they are in such conflict or inconsistent.

SECTION IV. This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon final passage, approval, and publication as required by law.

GENERAL ORDINANCE NO. 1877 AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 8 OF THE CODE OF THE TOWN OF WESTFIELD TO ADD ARTICLE VI ENTITLED "MAINTENANCE OF SITES UNDER CONSTRUCTION"

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Town of Westfield as follows:
SECTION I:
Chapter 8, Buildings is hereby amended to include the following Article:

ARTICLE VI. MAINTENANCE OF SITES UNDER CONSTRUCTION.

Sec. 8-40. Definitions.
The following terms shall be defined in this Article as follows:
a) **Contractor.** The person or entity identified on the building permit issued by the Town of Westfield Construction Official as the contractor.

b) **Construction Site.** The real property identified in a building permit issued by the Town of Westfield Construction Official or the real property identified in a demolition permit issued by the Town Council or, in the event no such permits have been issued, the property identified on the tax map of the Town of Westfield where demolition, excavation or construction is occurring.

c) **Commencement of Work.** Any activity by the Contractor, Owner, or agent of either, that begins the process of construction, demolition or excavation, which includes but is not limited to, the use and storage of machinery and supplies.

d) **Excavation.** The digging and/or removal of soil or other material forming the surface grade of a construction site so as to leave a hole and or cavity in the surface grade.

e) **Owner.** The person or entity vested with legal title to the Construction Site as recorded with the Town of Westfield Tax Assessor.

Sec. 8-41. Securing the Construction Site.

It shall be the responsibility of the Contractor working at any Construction Site or the Owner of a Construction Site to secure the Construction Site with a six (6) foot chain link fence, with posts anchored in the ground, around the entire perimeter of the Construction Site, or in an other manner as the Construction Official in the reasonable exercise of his discretion may determine is necessary so as to protect the health and safety of the public. The perimeter fence shall be installed prior to the Commencement of Work and remain on the Construction Site until a Certificate of Occupancy is issued or until the Construction Official determines the Construction Site no longer requires fencing. In addition, the Construction Official shall have the authority to require that fencing of the type described herein be installed by the Contractor or Owner of such lesser portion of a given Construction Site, than the entire perimeter, as he shall determine based upon the extent of the demolition, excavation and/or construction.

Sec. 8-42. Penalties.
Any violation of the provisions of this Article shall result in a fine of up to \$200 per day. The Owner of any Construction Site and any Contractor operating, engaged to operate or otherwise working at a Construction Site shall be jointly and severally liable for any violation of the provision of this Article.

SECTION II.
Any or all ordinances or parts thereof in conflict, or inconsistent, with any part of the terms of this ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent that they are in such conflict or inconsistent.

SECTION III.
In the event that any section, part or provision of this ordinance shall be held to be unconstitutional or invalid by any court, such holdings shall not affect the validity of this ordinance as a whole, or any part thereof, other than the part so held unconstitutional or invalid.

SECTION IV.
This ordinance shall take effect after passage and publication as soon as, and in the manner provided by law.

GENERAL ORDINANCE NO. 1875 AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE CODE OF THE TOWN OF WESTFIELD, CHAPTER 13

BE IT ORDAINED by the Town Council of the Town of Westfield in the County of Union:

SECTION I:
1. Section 13-35A shall be amended to add the following subsections:

Sec. 13-35A. Parking lot no. 9.
(B) Night Hours

(1) Parking lot no. 9 is hereby designated as a "Night Hours" parking lot for residents of the Town of Westfield Central Business District ("CBD") who have been issued permits as set forth below. Night Hours is defined as the hours of 6:00 P.M. to 6:00 A.M. seven (7) days per week.
(2) Residents who reside within the CBD (hereinafter sometimes referred to as "CBD") or owners of residential property in the CBD shall be entitled to purchase a permit allowing CBD residents or tenants of CBD property owners to park in municipal parking lot no. 9 between the hours of 6:00 P.M. to 6:00 A.M. seven (7) days per week. Permits shall be issued by the Town of Westfield Police Department to individuals residing in the Town of Westfield within the CBD or owners of property within the CBD based upon adequate proof of residence, and/or ownership, in such form as shall be acceptable to the Police Department of the Town of Westfield.
(3) The quantity of Night Hours parking permits to be sold shall be vested in the discretion of the Town of Westfield Police Department recognizing the need to accommodate adequate parking for CBD during Night Hours.
(4) The Westfield Police Department shall designate the number and location of parking spaces to be used by holders of Night Hours parking permits.
(5) Only holders of properly displayed Night Hours parking permits may park in those parking spaces designated for use by Night Hours permit holders during Night Hours.
(6) The Night Hours parking permit to be issued by the Town of Westfield shall be affixed to a location specified by notice given to the permit holder at the time of the issuance of the permit and shall be clearly visible in the parked vehicle at all times during which the vehicle is parked in Night Hours designated parking spaces located in municipal parking lot no. 9.
(7) The cost for a Night Hours parking permit for CBD residents shall be \$120.00 for an annual permit and \$60.00 for a six (6) month permit.
(8) Parking in spaces designated for use by Night Hours permit holders without a Night Hours permit properly displayed between the hours of 6:00 P.M. to 6:00 A.M. seven (7) days per week is violation of this Chapter.

2. Section 13-35.1 of Chapter 13 of the Town Code shall be replaced with the following:

Sec. 13-35.1. All Night Parking.
(a) Holders of Night Hours parking permits may park all night in the spaces designated by the Westfield Police Department in lots 4 and 9;

SECTION II.
Any or all ordinances or parts thereof in conflict, or inconsistent, with any part of the terms of this ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent that they are in such conflict or inconsistent.

SECTION III.
In the event that any section, part or provision of this ordinance shall be held to be unconstitutional or invalid by any court, such holdings shall not affect the validity of this ordinance as a whole, or any part thereof, other than the part so held unconstitutional or invalid.

SECTION IV.
All sections of this ordinance shall take effect after passage and publication, as soon as, and in the manner provided by law.
