

William H. Imgrund, Local Attorney; Navy Veteran Was Active With GOP

William H. Imgrund of Westfield passed away on Wednesday, January 10, at Runnells Specialized Hospital of Union County in Berkeley Heights after a long illness.

Born in Newark on January 5, 1934, Mr. Imgrund grew up in West Orange, graduating from West Orange High School in 1952. He attended Seton Hall University and, after graduating in 1956 with a degree in political science, he entered the United States Navy.

Mr. Imgrund was accepted into Officers Candidate School in Newport, R.I., and after being commissioned he proudly served aboard the USS *Brister* as the engineering officer. Stationed in Pearl Harbor, the *Brister* followed the DEW Line to Alaska. His Navy years remained one of the fondest memories of his life and he maintained lifelong friendships with many of his fellow officers and men of the *Brister*.

After his Navy service, Mr. Imgrund entered New York Law School. Admitted to the New Jersey Bar in 1966, he maintained a law practice in Westfield since 1970. He also served as the planning board attorney for Mountainside, Berkeley Heights and Watchung in the 1970s.

Mr. Imgrund lived in Watchung before moving to Westfield in 1978. In addition to his membership in the New Jersey Bar Association, he was a

member of American Legion Martin Wallberg Post No. 3 in Westfield, the Tin Can Sailors Association and the United States Naval Institute.

He also was active in the Somerset County Republican Club for many years as well as the Lions Club of Westfield and was a member of the Holy Trinity Roman Catholic Church in Westfield. Known for his knowledge of politics, he also will be fondly remembered by all who knew him for his sardonic sense of humor and sarcastic wit.

Mr. Imgrund is survived by his wife of 29 years, Carmen; two daughters, Marcy Vigners of Manasquan and Sydney Johnson of Maplewood; two sons, Mark Imgrund of Los Angeles, Calif. and Christopher Imgrund of Warren, and a stepdaughter, Robin Ratkowski of Westfield. He also is survived by two brothers, John Imgrund and Robert Imgrund, both of Brielle; two sisters, Jean Milone of Severna Park, Md. and Mary Lou Hart of Spring Lake, and six grandchildren.

A Mass of Christian Burial was offered on Monday, January 15, at the Holy Trinity Church. Burial took place at Fairview Cemetery in Westfield.

GENERAL ORDINANCE NO. 1892

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE CODE OF THE TOWN OF WESTFIELD, CHAPTER 16, "PARKS AND RECREATION" BY CHANGING CERTAIN FEES FOR MEMBERSHIP IN THE MEMORIAL POOL AND BY ESTABLISHING CERTAIN NEW MEMBERSHIP CATEGORIES.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Town Council of the Town of Westfield as follows: That Section 16-12 "Fees established" be amended to read as follows:

Class of Membership	Resident	Non-Resident
1. Family	\$350.00 (\$ 327.10 + \$22.90 state sales tax)	\$610.00 (\$ 570.10 + \$39.90 state sales tax)
2. Family with full time child care	\$530.00 (\$ 495.30 + \$34.70 state sales tax)	\$940.00 (\$ 878.50 + \$61.50 state sales tax)
3. Husband and Wife without children		
OR Parent with child under 12	\$270.00 (\$ 252.30 + \$17.70 state sales tax)	\$505.00 (\$ 472.00 + \$33.00 state sales tax)
4. Individual	\$180.00 (\$163.20 + \$11.80 state sales tax)	\$335.00 (\$ 313.10 + \$21.90 state sales tax)
5. Senior Citizen	\$75.00 (\$70.10 + 4.90 state sales tax)	\$140.00 (\$ 130.80 + \$9.20 state sales tax)

SECTION III. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict, or inconsistent, with any part of the terms of this ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent that they are in such conflict or inconsistent.

SECTION IV. In the event that any section, part or provision of this ordinance shall be held to be unconstitutional or invalid by any court, such holding shall not affect the validity of this ordinance as a whole, or any part thereof, other than the part so held unconstitutional or invalid.

SECTION V. This ordinance shall take effect after passage and publication as soon as, and in the manner, permitted by law.
