

Reeve House to Showcase Exhibit and Bookbinding

WESTFIELD — The Westfield Historical Society in conjunction with the Book Arts Roundtable will debut an exhibit of handmade artists' books on Friday, April 25, beginning with an exhibit opening and reception at 7 p.m. It will take place at the Reeve History and Cultural Resource Center, located at 314 Mountain Avenue in Westfield. The exhibit will be open Fridays through Sundays from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. until Saturday, May 10.

The exhibit will feature 39 pieces from 19 different artists. Each book is a one-of-a-kind piece of art. The books represent various art mediums including watercolor, collage, handmade paper, stenciling, inks, wood, photographs and etching, among others. Books range in size from miniature to large panels and all will be offered for sale on opening night and throughout the exhibit.

The Book Arts Roundtable began in February of 2000 in order to provide a place for artists, bookbinders and people who love books and paper to gather and share their work. They meet once a month to share ideas and, when possible, a member

of the group puts on a workshop or demonstration. The group also hires artists and bookbinders to teach weekend workshops, conducts a semi-annual book swap and has created nine books collaboratively.

In addition to the exhibit, a workshop with Book Arts Roundtable artist Joe Reilly will be given on Sunday, May 4, from 12:45 to 3 p.m. at the Reeve House. Participants will learn the basics of bookbinding and make two books in one afternoon: a softcover pamphlet stitch and a hardcover accordion book. They will learn how to score and fold paper, stitch with linen thread, glue paper to board, and determine the grain of paper. Participants also will have an opportunity to tour the exhibit. All materials will be supplied, including Japanese paper, text paper and linen thread.

Seating is extremely limited for the workshop, so reservations are encouraged. There is a suggested \$5 donation for the workshop. Library Programs to Salute Doo-Wop Music and Poetry

WESTFIELD — The Westfield Memorial Library, located at 550 East Broad Street, will present two programs this month highlighting music and poetry.

"Under the Street Lamp: Tales from the Doo Wop Era" will be offered on Wednesday, April 23, at 7 p.m. A celebration of National Poetry Month will take place on Saturday, April 26, at 2 p.m.

"Under the Street Lamp" will explore the history and spirit of doo-wop music. Music historian Charles Horner will reveal the true stories behind the Dominoes, the Moonglows, Frankie Lymon & the Teenagers, and the Harptones. He also will play such famous music as "In the Still of the Night," "Gloria" and "Earth Angel."

A former radio personality on Philadelphia's WXPB-FM for 20 years, he has interviewed hundreds of 1950s singers. His presentation, along with Pamela Horner, is assembled through the memories of singers from the 1950s and their personal stories, as well as his huge archive of records, photographs, sheet music and other memorabilia. Some memorabilia will be displayed during the talk.

Ms. Horner has been an aficionado of rhythm and blues vocal group harmony for more than 20 years. She is an educator, administrator, researcher and writer.

The Horners' company, Classic Urban Harmony, LLC, promotes the legacy of rhythm and blues vocal group harmony (1940s through 1960s), doo-wop music, soul harmony, spiritual quartet singing and early rock and roll music through multimedia presentations, workshops, courses, historical research and displays.

Poets whose work has appeared in the New Jersey-based *Tiferet* journal will read from this publication and others at the April 26 program.

Screenwriter David Magee To Speak to College Club

Mr. Magee wrote the screenplay for director Ang Lee's film *Life of Pi*, based on the award-winning novel by Yann Martel. Among its many accolades, the film received 13 Oscar nominations, including one for Best Adapted Screenplay.

His first screenplay was *Finding Neverland*, directed by Marc Forster and starring Johnny Depp; the film went on to garner seven Academy Award nominations, including one for Best Adapted Screenplay. Mr. Magee's second film, *Miss Pettigrew Lives for a Day*, starred Amy Adams and Frances McDormand and was written with Simon Beaufoy, who won a Best Adapted Screenplay Oscar for *Slumdog Millionaire*.

Mr. Magee originally studied theater directing, design and acting, earning a Bachelor of Arts degree from Michigan State University in 1984 and a Master of Fine Arts degree from the University of Illinois in 1987. He spent years performing in New York and in regional theaters around the country. Along the way, he also did extensive voiceover work, including the narration of several audiobooks, which led to the opportunity to write the abridgements of novels for audio recording.

Over the course of five years, he wrote the abridgements of 85 novels, including bestsellers by authors from nearly every genre. Eventually, he tried his own hand at writing, and a production of his play *Buying the Farm* led to the opportunity to write *Finding Neverland*.

He was the 2013 Semel Chair of Screenwriting at Emerson College and was awarded UCLA's Screenwriter of the Year for 2013. Mr. Magee has lived in Scotch Plains since 2002 with his wife, Pam, and their three children.
