Garwood Council Pundits Pooh-Pooh Opposition Candidate

Recently Tina Simitz wrote a letter to the editor with her thoughts on her campaign for council. Here are our thoughts on her campaign. We wish that we had met council candidate Tina Simitz outside of the campaign. We look forward to talking to her outside of the political spectrum after the campaign.

While she has only lived in Garwood for four years and attended only two Council meetings, she seems to have great knowledge of the council's supposed fiscal irresponsibility, unaccountability, and failure to generate ideas. But she has signed up with the wrong team. The "small town feel with centrally-located convenience and access to everything the surrounding towns have to offer" and "the close knit neighborhoods" that she stated she loves in Garwood (as do we) have been created formally through bi-partisan cooperation between past elected and appointed members of Garwood's council and planning boards, and informally through the work, dedication and resolve of long time Garwood residents.

We Garwoodians have created our community by working together to advance the best interests of the residents. Up until current Garwood Republican Chair Jim Mathieu created discord between our parties, we truly worked together to advance what would be best for Garwood.

Candidate Simitz raises concerns about the Athletic Field Complex (AFC). The same questions we have all raised. We are glad that she initially supported the AFC, and we hope that she still does, as we continue to do. It will be a great complex when completed for all Garwood residents. Yes, it is delayed. Long and unfortunately delayed. But, we assure her that these delays will not jeopardize a third year of the Little League not being able to play on the new field.

It is truly 'silly' and deceitful to Garwood residents for her to make such a statement. The complex will be done this year. I hope that Mrs. Simitz hasn't forgotten that Mr. Mathieu has opposed this beneficial community complex from the beginning. We think that she is working with the wrong team.

As far as flooding and rats, we wish that candidate Simitz had attended previous Council meetings. Both of these issues were discussed and answered in

great detail. If you had been there, you would know the answers. You can still read the Council minutes. Republican Chairman Mathieu knows the answers, and the AFC is not responsible for either issue. It appears that the Council candidate is not being told everything. We think she is working for the wrong team.

Candidate Simitz makes an allegation about council needing to reserve tax funds for overages at the AFC. Wow! First of all, the AFC is still under budget. Second, the AFC is a capital project; tax dollars cannot be used for bonded capital projects. The Republican chair knows this. Hasn't he told the Council candidate? We think she is working for the wrong team.

Candidate Simitz raises the issue we knew would be raised. Why did Council agree to raise taxes by one tax point — the lowest increase in years? Chairman Mathieu knows why. He supported hiring the 16th police officer. He supported - indeed fought for - LOSAP payments to our volunteer firemen. He supports redevelopment of our distressed industrial areas. These actions cannot advance without funding! Mr. Mathieu then voted against the budget that would allow for such actions to take place. Thank God the rest of Council are not hypocrites.

Unless Mrs. Simitz opposes the police officer hiring, the volunteer firemen, and redevelopment, we believe that she is working for the wrong team. In closing, we hope that candidate Simitz is beginning to understand that she is being misled.

We have read how new Tea Party Republicans such as Candidate Simitz are going to reduce taxes while providing the same services. Unfortunately, we do not believe that this new Republican group really knows how to do that. We have seen no plan.

We know that Councilman Mathieu really only supports police, fire and public works municipal employees, and believes that all other boro services, youth and senior programs, and boro administration are unnecessary 'fluff'. Probitas Versus Honos

Athletic Field Complexes Are The Rage, But Where Are Priorities?

In a perfect world the \$3.2-million athletic field complex being built in Garwood would be fine, but this is not a world of unlimited resources and Garwood is not wealthy Beverly Hills nor super rich Palm Beach and Palm Springs!

Nor is Springfield with its \$3.4-million brilliantly lit turf field! Nor Madison nor New Providence with their own equally expensive lighted turf field. Westfield voters barely turned down the proposal for \$3.3-million lighted turf field. Union County College though is embarked on a \$1.4-million athletic field and track though its library, as I can say having been a professor there for a number of years, is inadequate to service the research and other academic needs of its students! And lacks for space!

But even wealthy communities had best consider priorities. That academics are of far more consequence to student and country than sports, however popular they are, however important they may seem to be!

Garwood is a fine place to live but was is a borough of 4,226 people (2010 census) and an acreage of .664 square miles doing building a \$3.2-million sports complex?

The Garwood Free Public Library with 28,000 "items" (library website) is not exactly rolling in money. If it were its collection, as fine as it is, would be well more than 28,000 "items!" And would be a separate building, not a section of the Lincoln School.

Nor is The Education Foundation of Garwood that does such excellent work exactly rolling in money! Think of what \$3.2 million would do if the Foundation could use it "in maintaining and enhancing the quality of education in Garwood!" How many grants could be given to "enable teachers at all grade levels to purchase new equipment and materials for use in their classrooms as well as scholarships for worthy Garwood students" and help with "many larger school-based projects." (Foundation website)

What would \$3.2 million do to help the Garwood Superintendent of Schools to "prepare pupils to be life-long learners, good citizens, and be involved community members by providing a positive and productive learning environment that will empower each child to develop his/her potential while building and fostering enthusiasm, curiosity, responsibility, creativity, critical thinking, and problem solving skills?" (Superintendent's website).

They used to say that the Battle of Waterloo was won on the playing fields of Eton College. And thus Napoleon was defeated by Wellington.

Yes, sports is important in building morale and in developing discipline in children that seems to be an increasingly rare quality.

But there is more to life and certainly more to education than the abil-

ity to hit a baseball, kick a soccer ball, throw a football, get par, bowl a perfect game, swim a mile, win the tennis match!

The central educational concerns of our society must be reading, writing, arithmetic, science, technology, philosophy, political science, economics, arts appreciation, engineering, and, importantly, vocational skills! As it is, our beloved country is having increasingly difficulty at home and abroad competing in the market place for want of skills and work place values.

Put another way, completing a touchdown is not the same as completing a sentence. Scoring a goal not as important as scientific calculation. Running a track not as important as running a business!

John D. Rockefeller did not build the oil industry nor Andrew Carnegie the steel industry nor Bill Gates the software industry by playing sports! They built their respective industries by knowing how to do so. That is by having the education and the learned skills to do so!

Yet across the country athletic field complexes are the rage. Every town it seems has to have at least one! And they must be artificial turf fields lest the students come in contact with mud. And be lighted so that the students rather than burn the midnight oil studying can play ball to their hearts content in the late evening! And there must be actual stadium stands lest anybody have to stand or bring chairs from home! And huge scoreboards that normally would only be found at professional fields. And uniforms! No thought that perhaps sports could be enjoyed in someone's backyard or on a dead end street!

Aristotle the ancient Greek philosopher who founded political science advised and warned, "All who have meditated on the art of governing mankind have been convinced that the fate of empires depends on the education of youth." But he was not talking about sports education!

Nor was his teacher Plato who in "The Republic" emphasized the importance of reading, writing, and arithmetic. And music. Yes, he believed sports important but who can believe that he would have thought an athletic field complex costing \$3.2 million was more essential than a library or a science or language laboratory or the most up-to-date textbooks and other teaching materials?

After the last game is over, the lights on the turf field turned out, the crowds gone home, the student must still learn the hard way those academic subjects without which neither the student may have a fulfilling and happy and prosperous life nor his or her country have the ability to compete in an increasingly competitive world!
