# Raiders Finished 20-1-2; Won Conference Title

Alex and Mike Ferrara (both 4-year varsity) and junior co-captain/holding midfielder Owen Murphy, with seniors Adam Weiner and Jack Hosmer on the wings, saw to it that the Raiders were applying constant pressure and setting up plays for their two attackers headed by co-captain Rock Valian and senior Zidan Abdella. But the Raiders also had plenty of depth and others, who could be shifted in and out of the midfield, were seniors Jon Koseoglu, Geraldo Salgado and Kevin Sheil, and juniors Chris Vinci, Alvaro Furfaro and Miles Longo.

"The two Ferraras, along with Owen Murphy, they were second to none. Obviously a big plus for us, our outside midfielders, wingbacks, we had several that we could use in any course of the game without missing a beat. With the style that we played, I have not seen a team that could possess the ball as well as we did and as much as we did during the course of the game. That allowed us to do what we did. If you have the ball and the other team doesn't, it's difficult for them to score," Coach Breznitsky said.

Alex Ferrara, who also had two goals and nine assists, and Mike

Ferrara, who also had a goal and seven assists, were selected First Team All-State and First Team All-Central 1 Section (Soccer Coaches Association of New Jersey - SCANJ). Additionally, both were named Co-Players of the Year (Central 1) and Regional All-Americans. Alex and Mike Ferrara were selected to play in the SCANJ All-Star Game in Tinton Falls on December 2.

"In my opinion Alex and Michael Ferrara are the two best center midfielders. They certainly were the engine that made Scotch Plains-Fanwood run. Their technical and tactical abilities, along with their ability to possess the ball were second to none. As identical twins it always seemed like one knew exactly what the other one was doing," Coach Breznitsky expressed.

The Ferrara brothers have committed to Rowan University to continue their education and their soccer careers.

The fact that the Raiders outscored their opponents, 56-14, in the 23 games was not only a testimonial to their ability to ripple the net, but also a real salute to defensive solidarity headed by sophomore center back Joey Linder, and juniors Ryan Widman and Alex Levy, who were all selected All-State Honorable Mention.

"It was an outstanding defense that we made the decision to go with only three guys, which is uncharacteristic on a high school level. But we felt that we had the players, who were able to pull that off, and they certainly had a great year in that respect. Plus characteristics, Levy was his third year, Widman was his second year and Joey was first year. He was called up at the end of last year's season. One of the reasons we were able to go three

backs was they all had very good quickness, good anticipation, understanding and they were able to shut down things before they had an opportunity," Coach Breznitsky said.

Rangy junior goalkeeper Danny Coyle (All-Central 1 recognition) made 37 saves and senior backup Eric Refinski made six saves.

Offensively, Abdella had an uncanny knack to penetrate the box in a timely fashion and led the team with 17 goals, while adding six assists. Abdella was selected Third Team All-State, First Team All-Central 1 and First Team All-Union County.

"He improved his game," said Coach Breznitsky, who added, "One of the other reasons we had success collectively is what we got out of Costa Rica and X-number of these guys worked very, very hard, got stronger and improved their game. They are year around players with their club teams and what we do in the summer. And Zidan was one who benefited from that. He started to buy into what we were trying to do with the offensive end of it. He scored in just about every game and in those that he didn't score, he had an assist."

Valian scored eight goals and added four assists. Koseoglu (All-State Honorable Mention), a penalty kick specialist, finished with 11 goals and four assists. Freshman attacker Tommy Rodriguez had eight goals and three assists, Furfaro had four goals and three assists and Linder contributed a goal and five assists. Widman added three goals and Owen Murphy (All-State Central 1 recognition, All-Union County First Team) added a pair of assists.

## Devil's Den

# Things Could've Been Different: What If ...

While browsing through a magazine rack last month, I came across a magazine titled, "WHAT IF ... Alternative History." It had dozens of short articles, like, What if ... JFK had not been assassinated ... China had discovered America ... Russia had won the space race, etc.

It got me thinking: what if we played "What if?" with WHS sports history? So, What if ...

... Scotch Plains HS hadn't opened in 1926?

The students from the eastern part of the township would be going to Westfield, and the western part would send their students to Plainfield. That would've spiced up the budding rivalry, and made the Union County's all-time winningest Group 4 schools into state mega-powers.

... Don Schneider had taken the WHS football job in 1955?

The North Plainfield coach was hired on May 3 to replace Joe Freeman by the Board of Education. But the former University of Pennsylvania star backed out of the deal a week later, saying he had made a "hasty decision." Schneider later successfully coached at Dayton and Watchung Hills, among other schools.

Two months after the rejection, Fred Bradshaw was named WHS's coach on July 5. (Soon after that, former Blue Devil and Bucknell standout John Chironna was hired as the head coach at Scotch Plains, and Chironna's WHS teammate Charles Frankenbach was toastmaster at a testimonial dinner for Freeman.) Bradshaw coached WHS to two 4-5 seasons, then abruptly quit and returned to Auburn, Ill. On July 2, 1957, his replacement was Ohio native Les Zorge, whose top assistant was an unknown first-year teacher named Gary Kehler.

... WHS's swimming pool hadn't been voted out of the budget in 1958?

It was going to be a 5-lane, 20-yard pool - typical size for that era - when it was voted into the budget in 1957. A year later, on April 29, 1958, the pool was voted out of the budget, replaced by a small gymnasium which is now the site of the weight room and wrestling/gymnastics room. Despite the support of the Westfield School Boosters Association and town heavyweights Joe Wiendl, Frank Ketcham, George Brownell, Charles Frankenbach, Al Danker, Charles Eddy, Norm Morash and others, the voters nixed the pool, for "financial reasons," by a 3,070 to 2,226 margin. Not building the pool reportedly saved \$50,000, or a one-time hit on each taxpayer of \$15 for construction and 60 cents per year for maintenance. So instead, the school has now spent approximately \$750,000 (maybe more) over the past 60 years to rent practice time at the YMCA and other area pools for the school's most successful athletic programs.

... Jim Leitz hadn't moved to New York State in 1959?

The speedster was in line to be the "next great tailback" in coach Les Zorge's single-wing offense, but Leitz's family moved after his sophomore year to Orchard Park, N.Y. Bob Wolfgang, who set a school single-game record with 251 rushing yards against Springfield, and Dave Reitze,

who set a school single-season record with 1,274 rushing yards, filled in quite well. Meanwhile, Leitz earned Parade Magazine All-America and later was a Little All-America at Williams College.

... Jerry Kroll hadn't moved to Texas in the early 1960s?

WHS would have had the 6-foot-4 Kroll on the front court for two years with 6-5 Bob Felter, 6-3 defensive whiz Jerry Richards and sweet-shooting Steve Wright, plus one year with 6-7 Jim Harmon. With Felter, who played for Frank McGuire at South Carolina, and Kroll, a 1,000-plus point scorer at Davidson under coach Lefty Driesell, it's likely WHS would have more than just the 1972 state championship. But Kroll's family moved to Houston, Texas, where he led Memorial High to the 1966 state title.

... Ken Loveland hadn't moved to California in the early 1960s?

It's hard to imagine anybody breaking up the backfield of the 1965 football team: quarterback Dick Stotler, and running backs Ron Hall, Joe Goski and Chuck Hood. But Loveland, who earned all-conference honors as a full-back/linebacker in California, was very good. And he was equally good in baseball, too.

... Norm Koury had stayed on as baseball coach after 1967?

Nobody can say what would have happened if the legend hadn't left town after 1967. But I would bet my beloved cats that the 1972 team - featuring pitchers John Havas, Steve Tebbetts, Tommy Anderson, Art Goldblatt, Linwood Hudson and Bobby Jester, plus field players Neil Chamberlin, Kurt Stiefken, Sean Kelly, Lou Case, Jeff Davis and Paul Pecka - would have finished closer to 25-0 than its actual 18-7.

... Title IX hadn't put girls sports on the same level as boy sports in 1972?

Caroline Baldwin, Jacki Booth, Claudia Carnevale, Denise Comby, Julie DeCosta, Chris Diemer, Krissy Jeremiah, Nancy Kasko, Hannah Kronick, Liz McKeon, Michele Mollard, Sally Parizeau, Kim Schmidt, Marcy Williams, and hundreds, maybe thousands of others who have competed for WHS over the past 4 1/2 decades would have been denied that opportunity.

... Chris Campbell's religious beliefs hadn't sidetracked his football career?

This is just my opinion (and certainly not a reflection on anybody listed here), but greets like Glen Kehler, Frank Kelly, Butch Woolfolk, Lee Gallman, Ricardo Johnson and Jack Curry would still be chasing Campbell's football records if he hadn't been a Jehovah's Witness. He had no background in wrestling and turned one season of high school (his senior year) into the stuff of legend - a 26-0 record, state champion, four-time Big Ten and two-time NCAA champion at Iowa, world champion, and two-time Olympian.

... Monte Turner had actually played baseball at WHS?

The 1974 WHS baseball team, with Turner on the bench, finished 8-13. The 1974 Post 3 team, with Turner in centerfield and batting .440, won the Union County American Legion League. He later played in the Pittsburgh Pirates' minor-league system.

... the 1976 and 1977 football playoffs had played down to a single champion?

1977: WHS beat Barringer, 33-12, in the North 2, Group 4 final. The other sectional Group 4 champions were North Bergen, J.P. Stevens, and Pemberton. Westfield would've won it all.

... Butch Woolfolk hadn't moved to town from Kankakee, Illinois, in 1975?

After spending most of his first two football seasons at WHS as an end on offense, Woolfolk got his chance to carry the ball after Chris Compton was injured in a late-season B squad game. The next year he had one of the greatest single seasons in school football history - running for 1,637 yards and scoring a school record 34 touchdowns: Jack Curry had 1,709 yards and 27 TDs on the 12-0 team in 2015. The 1977 team would still have been 11-0, but Butch made it much less stressful.

... Tom LaCosta hadn't transferred to the Peddie School in 1977?

It's fair to think that WHS would've won back-to-back state titles in 1977 and 1978, given the close losses they suffered to Cherry Hill East both years. LaCosta finished third at states in the 50 and 100 freestyles as a sophomore, and he was state prep champ in the 50 as a Peddie senior.

... Kevin Frega hadn't moved to Cazenovia, N.Y., in 2014?

After starting at inside linebacker next to Jack Simcox in 2013, winning two letters in wrestling and one letter winner in lacrosse, Frega's family moved north after his father passed away. At Cazenovia he captained the football and wrestling teams and starred on the lacrosse team. He is currently playing lacrosse at Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute.

... the 2015, 2016 and 2017 football playoffs had played down to a single champion?

2015: WHS beat Bridgewater-Raritan, 10-7, in the North 2, Group 5 final. The other sectional Group 5 champions were: Passaic Tech, South Brunswick, and Toms River North. Westfield would've won it all, but not easily.

2016: WHS beat Bridgewater-Raritan, 15-13, in the North 2, Group 5 final. The other sectional Group 5 champions were Ridgewood, Piscataway, and Millville. A WHS-Piscataway final would've been a must-see game.

2017: WHS beat Bridgewater-Raritan, 20-7, in the North 2, Group 5 final. The other sectional Group 5 champions were: Montclair, South Brunswick, and Lenape. The North survivor would've won Group 5.

Nellie Jester, the wife of Bud and the mother of a trio of outstanding WHS athletes - Dave ('72, tennis), Bobby ('73, basketball-baseball) and Bruce ('75, football-baseball) - passed away on Nov. 30.
