The kitchen and dining space are flooded with natural light, with access to a beautiful patio for al fresco dining. Features include a marble backsplash and island, a custom plaster hood, a full-wall bar and floor-to-ceiling metal wine storage. "Fabulous amenities," remarked Kelley, "and foiled wallpaper adds drama in contrast to the subtle surrounding color palette - yet another example of the signature 'laid back and luxe' touch.'

"The basement is the ultimate hang out for the two boys of the family," continued Kelley. "With an egress door providing direct access and natural light, this space, complete with a full home theatre and custom kitchen/ bar, is definitively unique!"

Highlights of the resplendent second floor living quarters include the master bedroom's cedar-planked tray ceiling and a magnificent his/her closet. The boys' rooms include custom builtins for schoolwork and storage, and a secret tunnel for adventure, reflecting the owners' fundamental design credo: homes can be simultaneously liveable and luxe, functional and fun.
