

McLANE WHS ALL-TIME GOALS, ASSISTS, POINTS LEADER

Blue Devil Laxers Finish 11-9; Vied for N.J. Group 4 Crown

Facing a rigorous, unforgiving schedule as always, and with the home field under repair, the Westfield High School (WHS) boys lacrosse team knew it would be in a battle to the end in nearly every game it played. The Blue Devil boys had a 2-3 record in the Fitch-Pitt Division that was won by the Seton Hall Prep (SHP) Pirates, advanced to the finals of the Union County Tournament (UCT) and the North Jersey, Group 4 Tournament, and finished with an 11-9 overall

against SPF early in the season. He had five goals and three assists against Rumson-Fair Haven, three goals and three assists against Pingry and Chatham, and six goals and three assists against Columbia. McLane netted three goals and four assists against Delbarton and three goals and three assists against Montclair. In the UCT game against Cranford, he had three goals and eight assists and in the sectional game against BrH2O, he had three goals and five assists.

For his efforts, McLane, who will play at Brown University, was se-

left in the second quarter. Duffy was selected Second-Team All-Fitch-Pitt and will attend Ohio State in the fall.

Sophomore attacker Mack Prybylski, an All-Fitch-Pitt Honorable Mention who scored 14 goals, was effective dishing out assists to finish with 18 for a 32 point total. Junior midfielder Nick Martini scored seven goals and had seven assists. Senior midfielder Dylan Alfano finished with seven goals and an assist. Attacker Aidan McLane netted five goals and five assists. Senior midfielders Koury Kania scored four

record.

Early in the season, the Blue Devils defeated the Scotch Plains-Fanwood (SPF) Raiders (17-7), Rumson-Fair Haven (RFH) (12-7), Pingry for the coveted Bristol Cup (10-5) then recorded a huge 9-8 victory over Chatham. They went on to defeat Columbia (13-3) and Montclair (13-6). As the second seed in the UCT, the Blue Devils defeated third-seeded Cranford (13-6). In their final regular-season game, the Blue Devils topped Fordham Prep N.Y. (14-2).

As the fourth seed in the sectional tournament, the Blue Devils demolished 13th-seeded Columbia, 17-6, then skinned the Bridgewater-Raritan (BrH2O) Panthers, 9-8, to reach the semifinal round where they topped the top-seeded Ridge Red Devils, 6-5, before losing to the third-seeded Hunterdon Central Red Devils, 11-5, for the title.

The Blue Devils' early-season losses came against Moorestown (10-3), SHP (10-5) and Ridgewood (11-6). They lost to Summit (14-7) in a regular-season game then dropped a 15-9 showdown against the Delbarton Green Wave and a 5-4 decision to Hunterdon Central. The Blue Devils were defeated by the Summit Hilltoppers, 9-4, for the UCT crown then were stung, 7-6, by Ramapo before tournament time.

Senior attacker Devon McLane, who stuffed in 58 goals and added 62 assists, completed his season as the WHS All-Time leader in goals (135), assists (171), total points (306) and single-season points (120). McLane also is No. 4 in single-season goals (58), behind Luke Prybylski (65), Ryan Yarusi (61) and Ed Joffe (59) and No. 2 and 3 in single-season assists (62 and 52), behind Joe Simone's 68.

Among McLane's scoring exploits was an eight goal, five assist effort

lected Second-Team All-State, First Team All-Group 4 and First-Team All-Fitch-Pitt Division.

Like McLane, senior attacker Jake Engelke, who will play lacrosse at Saint Joseph's University, had a variety of deceptive shots and made good on many of them with 51 goals to go with 15 assists for a point total of 66. He caught everybody's attention in the Union County Tournament semifinal game against Cranford when he flicked in six goals. He also had four goals and four assists against Pingry, four goals and three assists against SPF, four goals and three assists against Fordham Prep, four goals against Columbia and three goals and an assist against BrH2O. Engelke was selected Third-Team All-Group 4 and Second Team All-Fitch-Pitt.

Senior goalkeeper CJ Duffy, who was the goalkeeper on the hockey team during the winter, fired in 15 goals and added seven assists for a total of 22 points. Duffy had a three goal, one assist performance against SPF and two goals and an assist against BrH2O where he flicked in a key behind-the-neck goal with seconds

goals and had two assists, and Tommy McGuire put in four goals.

One of the several very effective defenders, senior Griffin Aslanian (All-Group 4 Second Team, All-Fitch-Pitt First Team), who will play at Georgetown, did manage to get downfield on occasions to contribute three goals and an assist. Juniors Colin Freer (All-Fitch-Pitt First Team), Hank Shapiro, Reid Colwell (All-Fitch-Pitt Second-Team) and Henry Meiselman, along with sophomore Sebastian Birse solidified the defense. Senior midfielder Matt Leone and junior midfielder Cam Parmelee both notched two goals. Shapiro scored two goals. Freer had two assists and Colwell had a goal and an assist, while Meiselman, senior Finn Collins and Dillon O'Connor each netted one goal.

Digging in most of the time at midfield, senior Matt Angelo won 38 of 71 face-offs. As the No. 1 goalkeeper, senior Theo Dardia (All-Fitch-Pitt Honorable Mention) made 157 saves. Backups Matt Gruters and Beckett Dardia made 22 and nine saves, respectively.

Raider Lax Girls Improved; Were Competitive in Division

Five talented seniors had to be replaced and some shuffling of positions were necessary this season but the Scotch Plains-Fanwood High School girls lacrosse team, although finishing with a 7-13 record, were quite competitive in the Independence South Division to finish with a 4-3 record. Although the Lady Raiders did take some lumps in a number of non-division games, they played well in the Union County Tournament and the North Jersey, Section 2, Group 4 Tournament.

Of the eight teams in their division, the Lady Raiders finished behind the Millburn Millers, the Livingston Lancers and the New Providence Pioneers, all who finished 6-1 in the division. The Raiders lost a 14-12 scorcher to the Pioneers, 17-7 to the Millers and 17-4 to the Lancers. Of their wins in the division, the Raiders stopped Newark Academy, 18-12, bounced Governor Livingston, 21-11, nipped the Cranford Cougars, 10-9, and edged Villa Walsh, 15-14.

Outside the division during the regular season, the Raiders beat Lakeland, 18-12. The Raiders were stung, 12-11 by Wayne Valley and 12-11 by Wayne Hills. Their other losses were to Old Bridge, 10-5, Hillsborough, 15-5, Indian Hills, 21-3, Mount St. Mary, 15-2, Glen Rock, 14-7, and Watchung Hills, 13-8. As the sixth seed in the

UCT, the Raiders trounced the Cranford Cougars, 14-6, then succumbed to third-seeded Westfield, 17-3. In the sectional tournament, the Raiders eliminated North Hunterdon, 19-8, in the first round then dropped a tight, 15-13, decision to North Brunswick in the quarterfinal round.

The Raiders got a lot of offensive mileage from junior attacker Maggie LaPolla who led the team in scoring with 50 goals and 18 assists for a total of 68 points. LaPolla netted seven goals and an assist in the UCT game against Cranford, six goals against Governor Livingston and five goals and two assists against Lakeland. Finally, she notched eight goals against North Hunterdon. LaPolla was named to the All-Independence South First Team.

Sophomore center Hailey Kinard proved to be quite tough in the middle with 64 draw controls but she was also second on the team with 34 goals, while adding nine assists for a total of 43 points. Kinard scored four goals and an assist against Governor Livingston and North Hunterdon. Kinard was selected All-Independence South Second Team.

Freshman power came from right attacking wing Elle Priesing, who notched 32 goals and 10 assists for 42 points and scooped 40 ground balls. Priesing also was selected All-Independence South Second Team.

Sophomore left attacking wing Carly Walker got into the act with 30 goals and tied LaPolla for the team lead in assists with 18 for a 48 point total. Walker scored five goals against Governor Livingston and had four goals and an assist against Villa Walsh. Walker was named All-Independence Honorable Mention.

Junior attacker Catherine Buren fired in 21 goals and added seven assists for 28 points. Junior attacker Brigit Jacob notched 11 goals and senior right wing Abby Saperstein netted 11 goals and five assists, while winning 40 draw controls. Freshmen Trish Gillian had six goals and three assists and Francesca DiLollo had four goals and two assists. Sophomore Ryann Wall finished with four goals and an assist, while senior Anita Dazzo and freshman Isabella DiLollo each contributed one goal.

Sophomore defender Erica Schug scooped 35 ground balls and was selected All-Independence South Second Team. Senior defender Kate Jackmin scooped 29 ground balls. Senior goalkeeper Libby Daniskas recorded 144 saves.

The Raiders will return nearly their entire team next year, so there should be no doubt that another step up the ladder of success is in store.

GENERAL ORDINANCE NO. 2136

AN ORDINANCE DESIGNATING 201 MOUNTAIN AVENUE, SHOWN ON THE TOWN TAX MAPS AS BLOCK 2407, LOT 1, AND COMMONLY KNOWN AS "TRIANGLE PARK", AS A HISTORIC LANDMARK AND MODIFYING THE ZONING MAP

WHEREAS, by application to the Westfield Historic Preservation Commission, The Town of Westfield, requests to designate the property located at 201 Mountain Avenue, Westfield, New Jersey, 07090, shown on the Town tax maps as block 2407, lot 1, and commonly known as "Triangle Park" a historic landmark, and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the provisions contained within the Historic Designation and Preservation Ordinance of the Town of Westfield, the Historic Preservation Commission gave full and complete consideration to the petition for historic designation of the property; and

WHEREAS, the Historic Preservation Commission held a public hearing on February 25, 2019 on the proposed historic designation of the property where all those who desired to be heard were heard; and

WHEREAS, the Historic Preservation Commission adopted Resolution Number 19-01 which sets forth its findings of fact, describes any public input received during the public hearing, and provides its rationale for its final decision on the historic designation which is to approve the application for historic preservation designation of 201 Mountain Avenue, shown on the Town Tax Maps as Block 2407, Lot 1; and

WHEREAS, at a public meeting held on May 6, 2019, the Town Planning Board reviewed the proposed designation pursuant to the Historic Designation and Preservation Ordinance of the Town of Westfield and New Jersey Municipal Land Use Law Section 40:55D-26 and found that designation of 201 Mountain Avenue, shown on the Town Tax Maps as Block 2407, Lot 1 would be consistent with the goals and objectives contained within the Master Plan; and

WHEREAS, the Town Planning Board noted that the property is identified within the Historic Preservation Element of the Town Master Plan as part of the Dudley Park - Kimball Avenue Historic Districts, but is not identified separately as an individual historic site. Although not identified as an individual historic site, it contributes to the historic fabric of the Town of Westfield.

WHEREAS, the Town Planning Board recommends that as the property is not identified as an individual historic site, but rather as part of a historic district within the

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HISTORIC PRESERVATION ELEMENT OF THE TOWN MASTER PLAN, THAT THE MAYOR AND TOWN COUNCIL INCLUDE THE REASONING BEHIND DESIGNATION WITHIN A RESOLUTION, AND RECORD THE REASONING IN THE MEETING MINUTES PURSUANT TO THE NEW JERSEY MUNICIPAL LAND USE LAW SECTION 40:55D-65.1; AND

WHEREAS, the Town Planning Board also recommends that the Historic Preservation Ordinance, Subsection 14 be amended to include property at 201 Mountain Avenue, shown on the Town Tax Maps as Block 2407, Lot 1, and the Zoning Map be amended to identify the property as a designated historic site.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT THEREFORE ORDAINED by the Town Council of the Town of Westfield, in the County of Union and the State of New Jersey, as follows:

SECTION I. The Zoning Map shall be and is hereby amended and supplemented by identifying the following property as shown on the Official Tax Maps of the Town of Westfield as a Historic Preservation Designated Site:

2407	1	201 Mountain Avenue

SECTION II. Appendix III of the Land Use Ordinance, titled the Historic Designation and Preservation Ordinance of the Town of Westfield is hereby amended by adding a new Subsection 14.N., to read in its entirety as follows:

N. Triangle Park located at 201 Mountain Avenue, Westfield, New Jersey shown as Lot 1, block 2407 on the tax maps, created in 1906 as the Town of Westfield's first park and having played a central part in the Town's history.

The Historic Preservation Commission shall be permitted to place an appropriate notation and plaque on said property indicating its historic landmark status.

SECTION III. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict or inconsistent with any part of this ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent that they are in conflict or inconsistent.

SECTION IV. In the event that any section, provision, or part of provision of this ordinance shall be held to be unenforceable or invalid by any court, such holding shall not affect the validity of this ordinance as a whole, or any part thereof, other than the part so held unenforceable or invalid.

SECTION V. This ordinance shall take effect after passage and publication in the manner provided by law.

GENERAL ORDINANCE NO. 2138

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 13 (MOTOR VEHICLES AND TRAFFIC OF "THE CODE OF THE TOWN OF WESTFIELD, NEW JERSEY," REGARDING PENALTIES AND FINES

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Town Council of the Town of Westfield (the "Town") have determined that certain penalties and fines related to motor vehicle, parking, and traffic matters should be adjusted in order to deter certain conduct already prohibited by the Town Code; and

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Town Council have also determined that many of its existing penalties and fines related to these matters are out of date and less than many other municipalities of comparable size in Union County and throughout the State of New Jersey; and

WHEREAS, there is a need to simplify its existing penalty and fine structure in Chapter 13 of the Town Code, so that they are easily understandable to the public;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED:

SECTION I. Chapter 13, "Motor Vehicles and Traffic," of the Town Code shall be and is hereby amended and/or repealed, as follows:

Sec. 13-7.1 (relating to penalties for through street, stop and yield intersections)

Sec. 13-15 (relating to parking during emergencies)

Sec. 13-16.6 (relating to parking on certain streets when snow covered)

Sec. 13-20.1 (relating to certain prohibitions on stopping, standing and parking)

Sec. 13-21.3(d) (relating to fines for parking in handicapped parking spots)

§ 13-21.3. Handicapped parking. [G.O. No. 1324, § IV; G.O. No. 1517, § IV; G.O. No. 1625, § I; G.O. No. 1822, § I]

(a) Definitions. As used in this section, the following terms shall have the meanings indicated:
HANDICAPPED PARKING SPACE—A parking space within a parking yard or parking places which are open to the public or to which the public is invited whether maintained or operated separately or in conjunction with any business or enterprise and which is designated by suitable signs as being reserved for parking by handicapped persons only and which has been approved by the Chief of Police of the Town of Westfield to be so designated.

PHYSICALLY HANDICAPPED PERSON—Any person who has been issued special vehicle identification by the Division of Motor Vehicles pursuant to N.J.S.A. 39:4-205 when using a motor vehicle property identified pursuant to N.J.S.A. 39:4-206 by a registration plate bearing the national wheelchair symbol or a temporarily handicapped placard issued by the Chief of Police.

(b) It shall be unlawful for any person to park, stop or attend a motor vehicle in a handicapped parking space unless such person is physically handicapped as defined above.

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(c) This section shall be enforced by the Police Department who may issue a summons or place a notice on a vehicle parked in a handicapped parking space notifying the operator thereof that a summons will be issued if the operator does not within 48 hours, present a satisfactory explanation to the Westfield Police Department as to why the motor vehicle was occupying a handicapped parking space. Said satisfactory explanation must meet the requirements of N.J.S.A. 39:4-205 et seq., and any amendments thereto.

Sec. 13-49 (related to parking meter, and Lot 8 and 9 violations)

Sec. 13-56 (related to unauthorized parking on residential parking permit streets)

SECTION II. Section 13-35.4, "Use of Skateboards, Roller Skates, or Roller Blade Skates Prohibited in Certain Parking Facilities," of the Town Code shall be and is hereby amended, as follows:

It shall be unlawful for any person to ride or use a skateboard or use roller skates or roller blade skates or similar devices at any time in the following municipal parking facilities and any access driveways or aisles contained therein: Parking lots nos. 2, 3, 3A, 9 and the parking lot at the Westfield Memorial Library.

SECTION III. Section 13-35B, "Permit Parking," of the Town Code shall be and is hereby amended, as follows:

(b) A vehicle occupying a reserved space without a valid sticker-permit therefor being displayed as aforesaid shall be towed away at the owner's expense and the owner of such vehicle or any person causing, suffering or permitting such reserved space to be occupied by a vehicle without authority from the Town of Westfield as provided herein shall be subject to a fine as provided in section 13-8(a) of this chapter upon conviction in municipal court.

(d) In order to obtain a parking permit the applicant therefor must be a resident of the Town of Westfield. The applicant must present such evidence of residency as the town clerk shall require and the applicant shall sign an affidavit that establishes such facts. The applicant must state in writing that he or she will not sell, assign, transfer, lend or give the sticker-permit issued to any other person, firm, association or corporation. If the sticker-permit issued to such applicant is found in a motor vehicle parked in a parking lot which is not the vehicle for which it was issued, the applicant for said parking permit shall be subject to a fine as set forth in Section 13-8(a) and shall permanently forfeit any rights to further sticker-permits in any municipal parking lot located in the Town of Westfield unless said person can demonstrate to the municipal court why such forfeiture should not be enforced. Such unmet parking spaces shall be in operation twelve hours a day, Monday through Friday from 6:00 A.M. until 6:00 P.M. prevailing time.

(e) The general public shall be obligated to pay the required amount for the use of parking meters from 10:00 A.M. to 6:00 P.M. Any person who is found to have used a parking meter space without proper payment shall be subject to the fines specified in section 13-8(a) of this chapter.

SECTION IV. Section 13-8, "Penalties for Violation of Chapter, Exception," of the

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Town Code shall be and is hereby repealed in its entirety and is replaced, as follows.

§ 13-8. Penalties for violation of chapter; exceptions. [G.O. No. 744, art. 14, § 2]

a. Except as set forth in sections b through e below, unless another penalty is expressly provided by New Jersey Statutes, every person convicted of violating any section of this Chapter shall be liable for a penalty of \$50.

b. Unless another penalty is expressly provided by New Jersey Statutes, every person convicted of violating any parking ordinance under this Chapter regulating metered parking shall be liable for a penalty of \$32.

c. Unless another penalty is expressly provided by New Jersey Statutes, every person convicted of violating any provision of Section 13.6 (related to snow removal) of this Chapter shall be liable for a penalty of \$150, in addition to any costs of the removal and storage of any unoccupied vehicle parked on the street.

d. Unless another penalty is expressly provided by New Jersey Statutes, every person convicted of unlawfully parking in a handicapped parking space shall be subject to a fine of \$250, and for each subsequent offenses, a fine of at least \$250 and up to 90 days' community service on such terms and in such form as the court shall deem appropriate, or any combination thereof.

e. Unless another penalty is expressly provided by New Jersey Statutes, every person convicted of violating Section 13-35.4 (related to skateboards, roller skates or roller blade skates) shall be subject to a fine of \$100.

SECTION V. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict or inconsistent with any part of this Ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent that they are in conflict or inconsistent.

SECTION VI. If any section, provision, or part of provision of this Ordinance shall be held to be unenforceable or invalid by any court, such holding shall not affect the validity of this Ordinance, or any part thereof, other than the part so held unenforceable or invalid.

SECTION VII. This Ordinance shall take effect after passage and publication in the manner provided by law.

The foregoing ordinance was introduced at a Regular Meeting of the Town Council of the Town of Westfield held on June 18, 2019 and was read for the first time. This ordinance will be further considered for final passage by said Town Council at the Westfield Municipal Building, Council Chambers, 425 East Broad Street, Westfield, New Jersey 07090 at a meeting beginning at 8:00 PM on July 9, 2019 or at any time and place to which such meeting may be adjourned. All persons interested will be given the opportunity to be heard concerning such ordinance.
