and took fourth at 80-8. Raider Suzanne Jackson took sixth at 79-1.

Blue Devil Lauren Triarsi took second in the long jump with a leap of 16-4, followed by Raiders Corinne Lyght at 16-3.5 and Ashley DeFrancesco at 15-11.5. Blue Devil Julia Csorba crossed second in the 400 hurdles with a time of 1:05.48. Raiders Nicole Agwu at 1:07.47 and Zuri Kennedy at 1:07.97 finished 4-5. Raider Julia Jackson finished fourth in the 100 at 12.92 and fourth in the 400 at 59.58.

Raider Olivia Zambrio crossed third in the 1,600 with a time of 5:25.36, followed by Blue Devil Grace Endy at 5:26.5 and Raider Sara Greene at 5:26.59. In the pole vault, Blue Devils Leah Norton placed third with a height of 9-0 and Raider Katherine Chouinard placed sixth at 8-0.

On Day 2, Hamilton, although finishing second behind Governor Livingston standout Victoria Vanriele, who crossed in 2:09.4, broke the WHS record by crossing in 2:13.1 with teammate Caroline Collins finishing fifth at 2:22.

"I knew that the girls in this competition were really, really good. I wanted to make sure that I wasn't going out too quickly but I wanted to be as aggressive as I could. I tried to trail behind some of the lead people and keep my pace. After the first lap, I was really feeling good, so I started to kick around the 400. The second lap was harder than I was expecting," Hamilton described. "I have been running 16[00]'s lately. Overall it was a short race for me. I was gassed at the end. I was proud of my teammates. Caroline Collins ran well."

She also competed at the Penn Relays. "We did the 4x4 at Penn. I am not much of a sprinter myself but I do run the 400[0] occasionally. That was a really good race. Overall my teammates worked really hard. We pushed ourselves and we got a good time. We were proud of ourselves," Hamilton commented.

sixth at 93-6. Blue Devil Sara Hacker finished second in the 3,200 at 11:32.19, followed by Zambrio at 11:46.98. Blue Devils Sara Salz at 11:50.41 and Elizabeth Bielen at 11:59.29 finished 4-6.

Tumbokon did win the event on Day 1 with a leap of 17-3.5 and Zoe Hamilton took sixth at 15-0.

The triple jump and 100 hurdles would be on deck for her on Day 2. On the 100 hurdles, Tumbokon said, "I try to get as low as I can. I just clear my head and run."

McLANE NETS 2 GOALS, ASSIST; DUFFY GOAL, ASSIST

Summit Downs Westfield, 9-4, For UCT Boys LAX Crown

The top-seeded Summit Hilltoppers defeated No. 2 seed Westfield, 9-4, to win its second straight Union County Tournament boys lacrosse championship on May 8 at Nolan Field on the campus of Johnson High School in Clark. John Fischetti scored three goals and added an assist to lead the Hilltoppers' offensive effort. Summit used a stifling defense to frustrate the Blue Devils transition game. After taking a 1-0 lead Summit never trailed on the way to its second consecutive win over Westfield in the championship game.

"We knew their top side players were very good and we just wanted to try and control the ground balls," said Summit Head Coach Jim Davidson. "We were conscientious about keeping them from getting out in transition and limiting our turnovers. They are a heck of a team. The McLane kid and the Engelke kid, they can go ahead and score goals at any time and in bunches."

Not on this night though. While McLane scored two goals and recorded an assist and Engelke added a goal, the Blue Devils' dynamic duo was unable to get into a rhythm and largely contained by a Summit defense that was nearly perfect.

Westfield did not help matters as they committed several unforced turnovers with off target passes.

Summit scored first on a goal by Fischetti with 7:41 left in the opening quarter. The Hilltoppers added to the lead just over a minute later when Luke DiNola scored courtesy of an assist from Skyler Schluter. Summit extended the lead to 3-0 when Schluter scored with 3:59 to go in the quarter. Westfield finally broke through when McLane scored with :59 left in the quarter. McLane was assisted on the play by Mack Prybylski. The first quarter would end with the Blue Devils trailing, 3-1.

Summit was still dominating play, however, and the Hilltoppers quickly answered with a goal by Greg Moller that made it 4-1 just a minute into the second quarter. Westfield responded with its best sustained effort of the match throughout the rest of the second quarter. Engelke scored on a feed by C.J. Duffy that cut the deficit to 4-2 with 3:07 left before the half. Then Duffy cut through the middle and scored with 1:21 remaining to make it a 4-3 game heading into the break.

"I thought we had some chances when it was 4-2 where we could have gone up by more but they did a good job of slowing us down a bit," said Davidson. "It was sort of a punch,

counterpunch thing going on. I just think our kids knew today that they had to do a really good job and stay disciplined. On offense, we just wanted to make sure we were getting the best possible shots whenever we could."

Summit regained command of the match in the third quarter. The Hilltoppers scored on goals by Fischetti and Michael Bonomo to make it 6-3 heading into the final period. In the fourth quarter, it was Fischetti once again delivering a dagger making it 7-3 with 7:58 remaining. Schluter then scored with 5:12 left to play for an 8-3 lead.

To their credit, the Blue Devils went down fighting. McLane scored on a sidearm shot from the left side with 4:36 to play. But Bonomo delivered the finishing blow when he scored with 2:20 left on the clock. The win for Summit over Westfield was the latest chapter in a long book of UCT Championship matches between the two schools, which have dominated the county over the past decade.

"Westfield is a great opponent," said Schluter, a senior. "They are well coached. I think the rivalry is great and always has been. As a senior, it feels great to be able to come out here and get a win in our last UCT game. It is just a great feeling and a great accomplishment for us."

Schluter finished with two goals and an assist, while Bonomo chipped in two goals. Moller had one goal and one assist, while DiNola added a goal. Summit goalkeeper Tyler Hadley recorded seven saves.

McLane led Westfield with two goals and an assist. Duffy had a goal and an assist. Engelke added one goal. Prybylski recorded an assist. Theo Dardia had five saves in net for the Blue Devils.

May 14, 2015: The Blue Devils girls lacrosse team advanced with a 17-8 victory over Randolph in the first round of the NJSIAA North Jersey, Group 4 Tournament held on May 14 at Kehler Stadium in Westfield. Senior Sam Paoletti, who scored three goals and dishd out two assists, led the Blue Devils. Sophie Bass and Julia Gretskey (1 assist each) also scored three goals.
